### SHIPPING DAY BY DAY

Marine Matters, Here, There and Everywhere.

The pilot schooner Ban Jose is in port The British ship Forfarshire arrived down the river yesterday. She is load d and ready for sea.

The British ship Duntrune, which re-cently salled for Queenstown or Fal-mouth for orders, carried 80.541 bushess of wheat, valued at \$2,000.

Pile tumors, run

Steamer State arrived yesterday morn-ing from San Prancisco. Her passin-ger list was large. After discharging freight she left up the river.

The steamer Alice Blanchard sailed Sunday for San Francisco. She carried 16,000 feet of lumber, 3,500 sacks of pota-tices and 250 sacks of oats. The lumber is consigned to C. A. oHoper & Co.

The British ship Principality, 1,69, Captain Jones, which arrived Friday might, left up the river yesterday afternoon. She has 2,50 tons of coal from Newcastle, Australia. The Principality is a line vessel, and has made several quick passages from London to this port. She is consigned to J. R. Cameron & Co.

The steamer Signal arrived yesterday from Vancouver. At the Pacific Can Company's wharf she discharged 26 totas of pig fron, 80 mats of rice and 143 packages of Chinese merchandise. Nine Chinamen, two of whom were for this port, came over in her. Collector Page yesterday allowed the two men to land. The Signal left up the river for Portland

Captain Bell, of the schooner Surprise, received a begram yesterday stating that the vessel had arrived at Port Angeles. She has a cargo of salted salmon here temorrow. The Alaska fishing business is not very profitable. There is an abundance of fish, but no market. The Surprise will probably make another trip north this year, after which she will be used in fishing for halibut off

Cape Flattery. The British ship Brambletye, 1,471 tons, Captain Gomm, arrived in pert last night to load wheat and flour for South Africa. This cargo will be the fifth of the flour and grain fleet loaded here since January 3 last for the dark continent. The Brambletye is chartered by Baffour, Guthrie & Co. The ship Brambletye sailed from Kobe, Japan, February 12, and made the passage to Puget sound in 28 days, the fastest trans-Pacific sailing trip performed this winter and one of the quickest on record over that course. If conversation with a News reporter The British ship Brambletye, 1,471 tons. It conversation with a News reporter this merning Captain Gamm said: "We ercountered the strongest succession of steady gales all the way on the passage that I ever experienced. Show fell every day we were out and it fell heavily hearly all the time. We were in a blinding driving storm from the cenast of annumerical storms. driving storm from the ceast of apan until we sighed Cape Flattery, and not a vessel was sighted on the voyage. I doubt if we could have seen a ship at spraking distance so thick was the weather with the falling frozen element. To add to the fury and disagreeableness of the situation constraints, weather of the situation, penetrating northeast and northerly gales swept our decks con-tinually and the sea washed our decks quite often. However the winds were guile often. However the winds were favorable to our course and we ran before a single upper topsail was set. The Brambletye was named after the famous English race herse that won every race he entered for 18 menths, and I believe from the record the ship made on the last run she well deserves to be associated with such fast company. The Brambletye has made other good records in her time. She is not altogether an old craft and

has made other good records in her time. She is not altogether an old craft and rot exactly new. She was run down and sink in Tusca harbe in the English channel about six years age. Her upper works are all new, so I take it the ship must have a dual age. The Brambletye carried keresene from Philadelphia to Kobe the voyage previous to the trip to Tacoma. Mrs. Gomm. wife of the master of the Brambletye, is aboard the ship. She has been cruising with her husband for mearly three years. She is a conventional, firm little English woman who considers life at sea perfectly delightful. Two years age she was on the Brambletye when it put in al Rio Janeiro while that port was under blockade during the revolution. The officers in the forts along the harbor signaled Captain Gomm to cast anchor cutside in the forts along the harbor signaled Captain Gomm to cast anchor cutside the entrance to the harbor. The captain choose to anchor inside the narbor and ran the blockade. In doing so he was fired at many times. Two balls struck the vessel, one carrying away the jibboon and the other penetrating the mizzenmast, where it made a hole as large as a man's arm. Mrs. Gomm was aboard the vessel at the time and related her experience to the New's reporter in the following words: "I was porter in the following words: "I was not greatly alarmed at the situation we were in; the gunners in the forts were were in; the grunders in the forts were such poor marksmen. Of course the whisiling of the missiles through the rigging was anything but delightful, but little good comes from being frightened. At American man-of-war soon came to cour relief and escorted our ship to safe anchorage. We had little regard for the shells of the beligerents. A certain lianding place had been set apart for officers and crews of merchant ships, but nearly every one aboard the fleet in the harbor chose to land at a forbidden pier. Whenever they did so they went into a swift steam launch, of which those in Rio can hardly be equaled for speed. Both the rebels and royalists would fire continually upon the boat from both sides as she shot along through the water. I run the gauntiet in the launches on several occasions and we always escaped without a scratch. Several times the smokestack was knocked from the launch and other alight damage done to

the boat. I thoroughly enjoy my life at sea, which is not without its romance, and I could easily tell stories that would make an entertaining chapter."-Ta-
