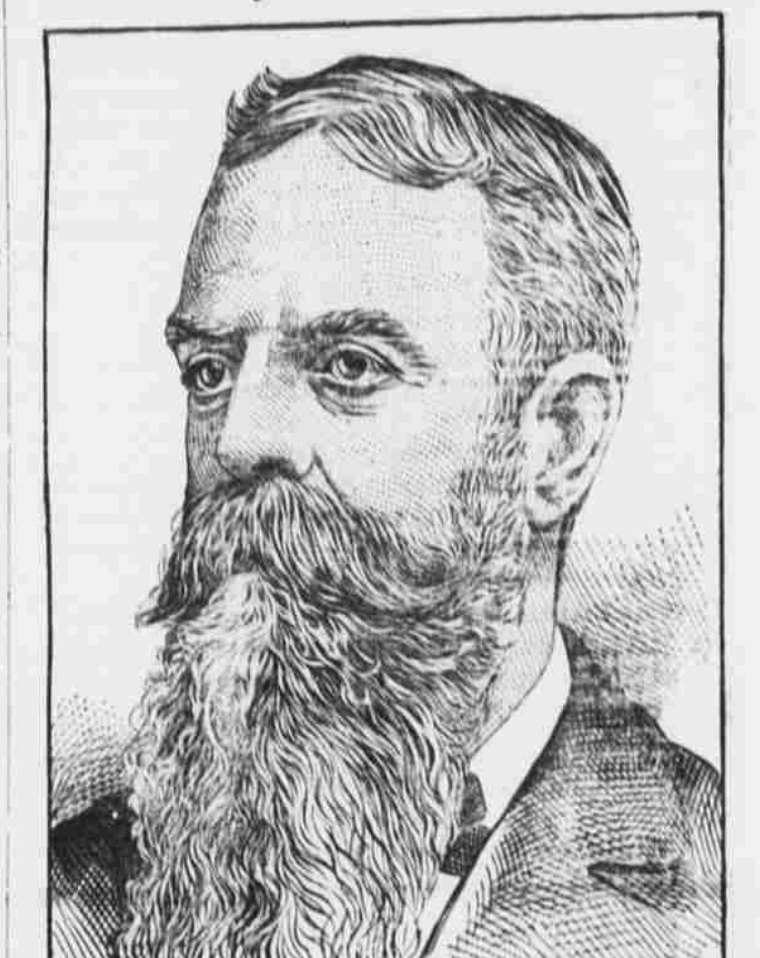

REPORT OF LLOYD'S SURVEYOR

Condition of the Wrecked British Ship on the Washington Coast. RECOMMENDATIONS ARE MADE. Capt. Pope Thinks Vessel Can Be Floated, but That She Should Be Stripped--Tenders to Work on Principle 'No Cure, No Pay.'

Astoria, March 24, 1896. P. L. Chery, Esq., Lloyd's Agent--Sir: Pursuant to your request, I have visited the British ship Glenmorag, which was wrecked on the beach, about three miles north of Ocean Park on the Washington coast, and beg to report as follows:

The vessel is imbedded in the sand to the depth of about nine feet, lying with the head to the sea, having both anchors dropped, which are about sixteen feet forward of a perpendicular line from the bowsprit, indicating that the vessel has moved through the sands shoreward that distance. It would appear that the vessel had struck the beach while the tide was in, and that the vessel was in the act of striking the beach at the time.
