COLUMBIA RIVER SALMON PACKERS

Articles of Incorporation of the Combination to Protect Their Interests Filed.

PURPOSES FULLY SET FORTH

They Select the Name 'Columbia River Packers Association,' and Will Control Prices, Promote the Industry, and Build Up the Salmon Trade.

After many days of hard labor the salmon packers of the Columbia river yesterday afternoon succeeded in coming to an agreement. An incorporation was made by all of the principal packers, and the papers were filed at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon in the county clerk's office. Some minor details yet remain to be arranged, but the main objects of the combination have been attained. The alliance is an offensive and defensive one; prices will be controlled both on the finished product and the raw material; every possible means will be used to advance the growth of the business, and to forward the increasing of the fish in the river; and with it all, it is proposed that every possible step shall be taken to make the Columbia Chinook the leading brand of salmon in the world. The full text of the articles of incorporation follows:

Know all men by these presents that we, J. W. Cook, S. Farrell, Geo. H. George, J. O. Hanthorn, M. J. Kinney, W. F. Tallant, R. B. Winter, Samuel Elmore, the undersigned, for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the state of Oregon, do hereby adopt the following articles of incorporation, that is to say:

Article I—The name assumed by this corporation and by which it shall be known is 'The Columbia River Packers Association.' The duration of this corporation shall be unlimited.

Article II—The enterprise, business and pursuit and occupation in which this corporation proposes to engage, and the objects for which it is incorporated, are and shall be to take such steps as may be necessary for the protection and propagation of salmon fish, and the forwarding of salmon fish in the Columbia river and the waters tributary thereto.

To purchase, sell, and dispose of packed salmon and to take such steps as may be necessary for the protection and propagation of salmon fish, and the forwarding of salmon fish in the Columbia river and the waters tributary thereto, and to do any and every thing necessary to carry on the business of the corporation, and generally to do, all things necessary and proper for the full accomplishment of the objects herein specified.

Article III—The principal office and place of business of this corporation shall be at the city of Astoria, Clatsop county, in the state of Oregon.

Article IV—The capital stock of this corporation will be Twenty Thousand Dollars, (\$20,000.00). This capital stock shall be divided into twenty shares of One Thousand Dollars each.

THE OUTPUT DOUBLED

One Million Dollars of Gold From Baker County Last Year.

Baker City Democrat. At the request of the director of the mint at San Francisco, J. T. Donnelly, cashier of the First National bank, has collected all the information obtainable regarding Baker county's gold output for 1895. His inquiry shows that \$70,000 is the amount. This is a gain of over 100 per cent in the government's report for 1894, and the sum named only includes the gold shipped through the express companies, the postoffice and the retail made from the Tacoma and Everett smelters to the Eureka and Excelsior, the Balsley-Elkhorn, the Columbia, the Rock Creek and the Robbins-Elkhorn mines.

FINANCIAL CONDITION

Everything Seems to Favor an Early Resumption of Gold Exports.

NEW YORK, MARCH 28.—The New York Financier says this week:

The statement of the associated banks of New York city for the week ending March 28 is in marked contrast with those made since the award of the government bonds, the loan item decreasing for the first time in several weeks. The loans, however, are still nearly \$20,000,000 in excess of the low record of February 3 last.

It is somewhat difficult to trace the cause of the falling off last week, except on the theory that stock exchange business was very dull and some banks, whose reserves have fallen too low, are calling in their loans and reserving some idea of the distribution of cash may be obtained. It is this fact that has forced a number of banks out of the loan market entirely. Banks are still holding cash, according to reports, the statement reflects, perhaps, the final payments made last week into the sub-treasury by the government depository banks.

OKLAHOMA REPUBLICANS

Oklahoma City, March 28.—The Oklahoma territorial Republican convention today elected delegates to the St. Louis convention, which brought on a bitter struggle between the Reed and McKinley factions. Tonight the Reed men are claiming a victory. However, Reed was not endorsed by the platform, and the Reed victory is limited to voting down the resolutions endorsing McKinley and the defeat of six McKinley candidates for delegates to St. Louis, and the election of a delegation said to be in favor of Reed. The platform declares for both gold and silver.
