

They Select the Name. 'Columbia River Packers' Association," and Will Control Prices, Promote the Industry, and Build Up the Salmon Trade.

After many days of hard labor the dmon packers of the Columbia river to an agreement. An incorporation was made by all of the principal packers, and the papers were filed at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon in the county clerk's office. Some minor detais yet remain to be arranged, but the main objects of the combination have been attained. The alliance is an offensive and defensive one; prices will be controlled both on the finished product and the raw material; advance the growth of the business, and to forward the increasing of the fish in the river; and with it all, it is proposed that every possible step shall be taken to make the Columbia Chinook the leading brand of salmon in the world. THE OUTPUT DOUBLED. One Million Dollars of Gold From Baker County Last Year.

Baker City Democrat.

At the request of the director of the mint at San Francisco, J. T. Donnelly, cashier of the First National bank, has collected all the information obtainable regarding Baker county's gold output for 1856. His inquiry shows that \$570,651 is the amount. This is a gain of over 180 per cent in the government's report for 1894, and the sum named only includes the gold shipped through the express companies, the postoffice and the resurns the gold snipped through the express companies, the postoffice and the returns made from the Tacoma and Excets smelters to the Eureka and Excelsion, the Balsley-Eikhorn, the Columbia, the Rock Creek and the Robbins-Eikhorn

A large number of Baker county mine owners find it convenient to forward their builton or placer gold to Boise City, and a large proportion of the Chinese take the proceeds of their season's work, all placer mining, direct to San Francisco. Owing to these facts, Helens, Mont, Boise, Idaho, and San Francisco, Cal, are credited up with a large share of the gold production which properly belongs to this state. Taking all the conditions into consideration, the most conservative estimate made would give Baker county \$1,000,000 for 1885.

SPANISH REVERSES. That Weyler Is Not a Success in Cuba Beems to Be Proven.

Key West, Pla., March 2t.-Gradually the trials of the severe reverses suffered by the Spanish columns in Pinar del Rio are being disclosed. According to advices received here from Havana the government forces have been defeated three those by Macco during the week, and each time with appelling losses. Colonel Hernange's column, 12,000 strong. was ambushed by Macco on the Gallop estate. Colonei Incian's column, 1,000 strong, came to Hernandez's assistance

and both were cut to pieces. Out of the 2,300 Spaniards engaged, the losses in killed, woulded and missing are said to Wednesday Macco met 2,000 Spanlards under General Linanez on La Mercede's estate. Macco's troopers literally rode down the Spaniards. The latter formed foto squares repeatedly, which were as repeatedly broken by the insurgent charges. In this battle the Spanish osses are said to have been over 400 min But the severest reverse for the Span-lards, considering the number of men engaged, occurred Thursday. On that day Colonel Francis, with 1,200 Spanlards, fought Maceo amid the ruins of Cayabon Maceo used cannon and the Spanish column was nearly annihilated, Colonel Francis himself being dangerously wounded, Of the 1,300 Spaniards it is said only 700 escaped unburt, the other

500 being slain or wounded. Among the slain were nine captains and sixteen Heutenants. In the three engagements the insurgents captured engagements the insurgents captured 250 rifles, many thousand cartridges and several field pieces. General. Weyler sent out a special ambulance train and twelve train loads of troops to succor the harrassed Spanlards. Weyler is said to be nearly distracted by the defeat of the troops, and also by the outrages committed by the Spanlah volunteers. It is stated, in spite of dental from Madrid, that he has sixed to brecailed. It is admitted in Havana that Weyler is a failure, and it is claimed that but for excesses committed since that but for excesses his appointment the people of the United States would not be clamoring for the recognition of the insurgents.

HOW OXFORD WON FROM CAMBRIDGE

Crews of the Two Great English Universities Row the Regular Annual Contest.

EXCITING FINISH

Thought for a Time That Cambridge Would Vin. but. With a Spurt Which Will Go Down in Rowing History, Oxford Gained the Day.

Special to the Astorian. Putney, England, March 28.-The Oxford crew, to the surprise of almost everybody, won the fifty-third boat race Cambridge by about one-third of a length after a most exciting finish. Thus Oxford has won thirty races of the series, to twenty-two won by Cambridge, the dead heat of 1877 making up the total number. This is the seventh year in succession that Oxford has defeated Cambridge. The time was 20:01. The course was the usual one, from Putney to the winning post, a distance of about

four and one-quarter miles. Cambridge was a hot favorite, at six to four and free takers. Cambridge em-barked first, won the toss and chose the Surrey side of the river, a decided advantage, as half a gale was blowing from shore, or about southwest, raising lumpy water everywhere, and quite a little sea at bad places.

Both boats got away sharply, Cambridge pulling a pretty thirty-six, to Oxford's slightly more powerful sweep of thirty four. There was little to choose between them until Clasp's boathouse as reached when the Cambridge boat's as reached when the Cambridge boat's nose showed slightly in front. At the half mile Oxford drew up, and shoved ahead at Falden's. At this there was great cheering, for it was apparent that a splendid race was to be rowed. But Fernie, Cambridge's stroke, quickly called his crew together, and, pulling a long, powerful, clean, telling stroke, regained the lead near Crabtree wharf, nearing the half mile post. The Oxford boat lapped up to and passed the Cambridgecraft at the soap works. After passing craft at the soap works. After passing the soap works, Oxford kept up the pace and lead by nearly a length at one time. Fernie called upon the light blues for a spurt and they responded with such vim that the Cambridge boat shot under Hamersmith bridge a short length ahead of Oxford, and, acording to tradition should have on the race. Cambridge at Thorncliff had a lead of about three-quarters of a length, and both crews

BATTLESHIP IOWA.
