THE FIRST IRON SHIPS Death of the Man Who Built Them for Oregon Trade.

The death of William H. Starbuck, mentioned in yesterday's dispatches, is of more than passing interest to Ore-gonians, especially to those who feel a pride in the growth of our maritime industry. American shipping lost one of its best friends in the death of Mr. Star-buck, and long after time has dimmed his fame as a railroad magnate, a cap-italist and a financier, he will be grate-fully remembered as the builder of the first iron sailing ship that ever floated beneath the American fag. Mr. Starbeneath the American buck's father was a prominent American shipowner, and the blue and white house flag so often seen in this port at the masthead of the ships T. F. Oukes and Tillie E. Starbuck, is the same as the one used by the elder Starbuck half a century ago. It has been truly said of W. H. Starbuck that he would rather make one dollar with a ship than so make a hundred with a railroad. Fer many years previous to the apoparance of iron ships in this country, he owned and operated a number of well-known. and operated a number of well-known wooden ships, those best known in Portnd being the Henry Villard, W. H. Starbuck, Astoria and Mount Washington. As the wooden ship was in a measure relegated to the rear, Mr. Starbuck commenced the construction of an iron vessel. She was built under the supervision of Lleutenant Gorringe, who pervision of the previous became famous through his work of bringing the obelisk known as "Cleopatra's needle" from Egypt to New York. On completion or the vessel, which was christened in honor of Mr. Starbuck's wife, Tille E. Star-buck, she loaded at New York for Portland, arriving here in 1883, bringing among other cargo the Northern Pacific transfer steamer Tacoma, which was put together in South Portland, The Sturbuck was followed by the T. P. Oakes, and it is but a plain statement of fact to say that no finer vessels over traversed. the ocean. Both of the ships have con-tinued sailing in the Oregon trade, the Starbuck being almost due from New York now. After completing the iron ships Mr. Starbuck disposed of his wooden vessels, J. B. Montgomery, of this city, purchasing the W. H. Starbuck. Nothing would induce him to part with the new vessels, though, and the well-merited praise they received from all merited praise they received from all parts of the world where they sailed afforded him more pleasure than did the profits. Mr. Starbuck's name will live in history as a patriot who has done much to restore the American flag to its proper place on the marine highways of the world.
