The county court convened Monday, and granted to Alex. Gilbert a license to sell liquor at Seaside for a period of six months. A petition in D. B. Ingram and others was read, asking that a part of the county road from Narcosis bridge to Stavobold landing be vacated. The prayer of the petitioners was not granted.

At the solicitation of J. Y. Coffey and twenty-nine others, of Astoria, Mrs. Nordland and six children were allowed \$5 per month, the family being in destitute circumstances. Emil Bergman, a native of Russia, was admitted to citizenship, as also was A. J. Erikson, of Sweden. R. Westbott, supervisor of road district No. 4, reported that a bridge in his district had broken down, and asked that the same be repaired. The matter was referred to Commissioners Woodson and Peterson, with full powers to act.

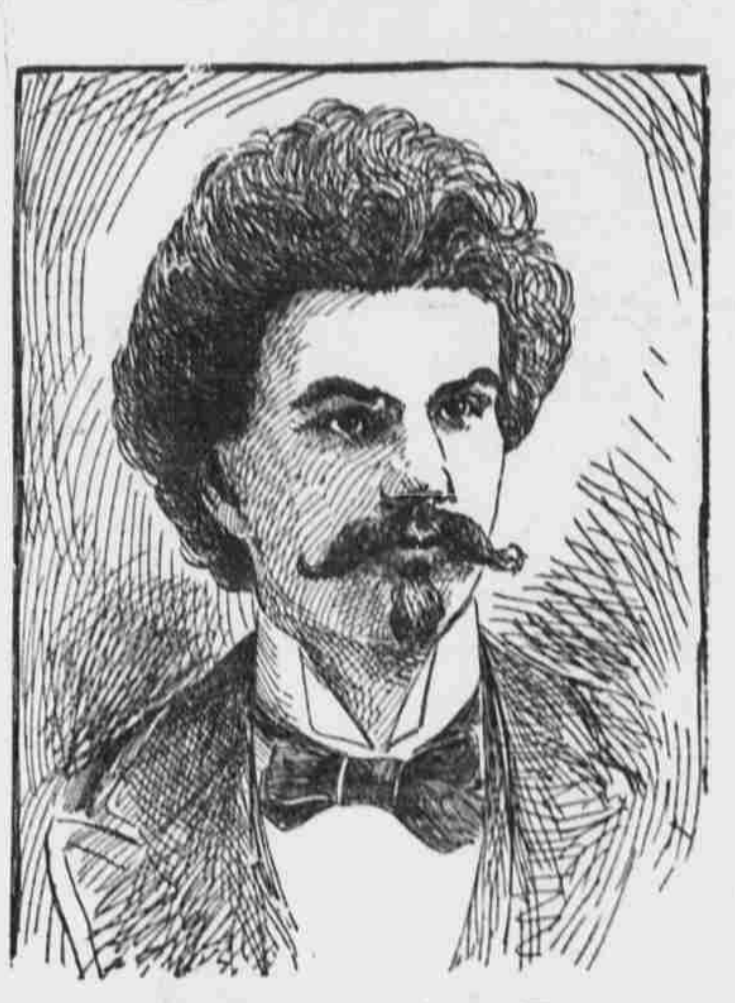
A petition presented to the common council by Hon. Young and others, asking that Thomas Stinson be made secretary in width, was presented to the county clerk for an official signature. The judge was authorized to sign said petition in behalf of the county. The application of Antonio Muller for relief was not allowed, at the suggestion of Dr. J. A. Fulton, who found the man was able to earn his living. It was ordered that the road supervisor of district No. 10 be authorized to let the contract for a bridge between Jewell and Yeager, near Crawford's place, to F. H. Woodson, whose bid was \$22,000. P. S. Phillips, of road district No. 2, reported that the bridge at Williamson creek was in bad condition and needed repairing. The matter was referred back to the supervisor, ordering him to make a report as to the amount and nature of the repairs required.

Yesterday Judge Gray and Commissioners Woodson and Peterson made a trip to Clatsop to examine the road connecting this city and Seaside. They found that the larger portion of the road between Hess' point and Ingalls' place was in fairly good condition, but that but from one to one and a half miles needed repairing. By the first of July, Judge Gray thinks, the road connecting the Seaside highway, near Clatsop, will be in excellent condition. NEHALEM ROAD. Fourteen Hours from Mishawaka to Astoria. Mr. Joseph Lynch, son of J. J. Lynch, postmaster and merchant at Mishawaka, was in the city yesterday. He said to an Astorian reporter that he started out on his journey from Mishawaka at 2 o'clock in the morning, and that it took his fourteen hours to reach Astoria. The road between Olney and this city is the worst part of the journey, and he thinks something ought to be done to improve its condition. It might be fixed by grading and the use of gravel or corduroy. The distance to Mishawaka is thirty-five miles, twenty of which are in very bad condition. It will probably cost \$200 per mile to put the road in passable shape. The farmers have spent all the money they can, but are now willing to do the work if Astoria merchants will furnish the material. So long as matters are in the present condition, the farmers of Nehalem cannot afford to come to town for one-tenth of their supplies, whether they want their products here. Business for all would be increased 100 per cent by a good road to the Nehalem, and Astoria merchants could not make a better investment than by purchasing the material for this work. Mr. Lynch says that the farmers are now planting potatoes, oats, wheat and vegetables, and that a big crop of hay is in sight. If decent roads existed, they could make the trip to Astoria in four hours where it now takes fourteen, and would be much encouraged to increase their production and their business relations with this city.
