



THE PACKERS

Meet Behind Closed Doors and Reaffirm Their Position on Prices.

NO WEAK-KNEED BRETHREN

Markets will Not Now Warrant Even Four Cents per l'ound on Salmon-Bayers Do Not Want Goods At Prevailing Prices.

The Columbia River Salmon Packers' Association held a meeting yesterday aftermson in Odd Fellows' hall. The procedings were strictly upon matters perment to the association, and the closing up of unimened business left over from the last meeting; consequently, all outsiders were burred.

After the meeting adjourned, it was learned, however, from one of the members, that the packers stood pat, on their original proposition, and would maintain the position taken as to prices to be paid for raw material. They will not pay five cents per pound because they say they cannot. No weak members were found in the association, and no disposition was shown by any one to back down from the position already

It was stated that the talk about New York market prices quoted in newspapers justifying the payment of hys cents for raw material, was made without true knowledge of the situation. In fact, it men's meeting. Dayers show no disposi-tion whatever to pay such prices, nor are they even willing to pay a price that will justify packers in giving four cents for raw material, to say nothing about five cents. The packers as a body expressed themselves as more time will-ing to pay five cents for fish if they could see their way clear to do so and get their money back. It was stated that there is not a packer on the river, with perseconds a drop of blood goes the round of the body. In about every two minutes the entre blood in the body makes the round through the right side of the heart, the lungs to the left side of the heart, through the arteries, the veins, again to the heart.

Taken altogether, from an outsider's standpoint, and looking at the matter in a disinterested way, there seems to be little hope of an arreament being reaches between the packers and of the the between the packers and the habermen at an early day. As a merchant said hast evening, it is to be greatly regretted that the packers cannot find some way to meet the demands of the men. The stand the packers have taken has affected every line of business in the city. Every merchant in the city, every bank, every real estate man; every lawyer, dictor, broker, clerk and laboring man, has al-

broker, clerk and labering man, has al-ready felt the contraction of business consequent upon the present treeble. It is only to be hoped that the condition of affairs may be seen adjusted. NECARNEY ROAD.

Spheription Raised by the Farmers for the Improvement of a County Highway.

op county, who was in the city vesterday, stated to an Astorian representative that the people in the lower Nebalem Valley were making strenuous efforts to secure a road to Astoria. They are at present without any means of transper-tation to their county seat except for a long distance over a very indifferent trail. The residents of that portion of Astoria is the natural market for their products, and the natural source of their

Mr Davidson says that the distance from the Tillamook county line to Sea-side is twenty miles, and that out of that distance there is only about twelve miles of a road in any sort of passable shape. In addition to the trade with the lower Nehalem, there is also a large amount of business that could be done with Tillamook county if there was a decent road between there and Astoria. a decent road between there and Astoria. The Nehalem people, through the efforts of Mr. Davidson, have within the fast few days raised a subscription of something over \$300 for the prosecution of work on this road. Everyone who has been consulted on the subject, agrees that the road should be built through from the Tiliamook line. The old Necarney road, up through Seaside, with the new road necessary to be built, can be put in passable shape at a cost not to exceed \$300 per mile. The farmers feel that the citizens of Astoria should come that the citizens of Astoria should come to their help, now that they have done all that they can. It is not a matter of charity, but a pure business proposition in which the merchants of Astoria are more largely interested than the farmers. An extensive silicolated trude is mers. An extensive, gilt-edged trade is being lost every day in this city be-cause the farmers have not udequate means of reaching their natural source of supply. The farmers, on the other hand, suffer because they cunnot find a market at a reasonable cost of trans-portation, for the produce which they might raise. In other words, they do not rear the crops they would, because of their inability of reaching market. Mr. Davidson says that if only a few hundred dollars were spent this meason in improving the worst part of the road, it would be of great assitance to them. The lower Nehalem people have this

The lower Nehalem people have this year a large crop of hay in sight, there are plenty of cattle in the country which are in good condition, and small fruits and vegetables will be plentiful. The loggers are doing a good business, and the Nehalem Mills are running full blast. There is only one dark spot on the horoscope of the Nehalem valley, and that is that Astorians and a large part of Clatsop county are paying more attention to the railroad than they are to the county road. the county road.


