RETURNED TO PORTLAND.

Three Crooks Wanted for Robbing a Man of Ninety-three Dollars.

Detectives Simmons and Cody, of Portland, arrived Sunday and took back with them this morning, Theodore Johnson, Albert Johnson, and Frank Parks, whom Chief Loughery had arrested at Chicago.

The crime for which Albert Johnson and Parks are wanted is the robbery in Portland of Sol Holton, a Southern Oregon man, the night of March 14, of \$3,000.

Sol Holton had been out during the evening drinking in North End saloons, where he picked up Johnson and Parks. When he returned to his room in a first-class hotel the two men accompanied him and told the police he thought they took his money after he fell asleep.

From the careful description given, the detectives recognized the two men, but on searching for them they were not to be found in the city. Their description was telegraphed to neighboring towns, which resulted in their arrest here.

Theodore Johnson, who also was arrested by the Astoria police, is wanted in Portland for the robbery a week ago of a set of harness from the store of Harry Quilton.
