COL COCKERILL'S CAREER

The Famous Correspondent Who Recently Died in Cairo, Exppt.

Col. John A. Cockerill, the famous respondent of the New York Herald, whose death was recently announced, was generally regarded as one of the epresentative newspaper men of Amerrepresentative newspaper men of Americs, having won this distinction by brilliant, energetic work covering a long term of busy years. He was born in Dayton, Ohio, in 18th, and began his newspaper work on the Scion of Temperance, when he was a very small youngster, indeed. When Z years of age he became esittor of the Dayton Ledger. Two years later (in 1870) he went on youngster, indeed, which a years of age he became silter of the Dayton Ledser. Two years later (in 1870) he went on the staff of the Cincinnati Enquirer, and before another two years had expired he was managing editor. On account of his good work he was sent by the Moleans as correspondent to Turkey during the Russo-Turkish war, and supplied his paper with brisk and brilliant specials. In 1878 he went to Baltimore, retuvenating the Gazette, and the next year he went to Bit Louis, where the Post-Dispatch needed his push and enterprise. In 1833 he went to New York and took charge of the World, "nder Joseph Pullitzer. The World was then a wreck, Jay Gould's ownership having been disastrous.
