It decided that the number was fifteen, and there-fors it ordered that for every maximum.

fore it ordered that for every grain of sliver in the gold dollar there should be fifteen grains of sliver in the sliver dollar The object of the framers of the law was to secure equality of intrinsic value in coins of the same denomination but of different metals, so that both kinds of coins would circulate side by side. It was intended that the law and the facts should conicide, but a mistake was made. A grain of gold bought then about $15\eta_{\rm g}$ grains of silver. So the gold coins, be-ing undervalued, would not circulate, and silver was the only form of specie

equivalent in value-in purchasing power equivalent in value-in purchasing power -of one grain of gold, and the weight of the gold dollar was reduced slightly to conform to the new ratio. 
