

NIAGARA'S ELECTRICITY.

Preparations for the Coming Exposition in Industrial Hall.

New York, April 24.-Elaborate prepara New York, April 21.-Elaborate prepara-tions are being made for the opening of the national exposition of electrical ap-pliances in Industrial hall May 4, to con-tinues for thirty days. It is expected that Governoer Morton will officiate at the opening, turning on a current of elec-uricity generated at Niagara Falls and transmitted over an ordinary commercial

This power will also be used in a cable and Queen Victoria's birthday. May 24, will convey a message of congratulation from President Cleveland to the queen. During the exposition it is believed the chief of the government telegraph lines will close a circuit and transmit a mea-sage around the world with Niagara electric energy. POPE CABLES HIS BLESSING.

St. Mary's Church at Milwaukee Cele-brates Its Fiftleth Birthday.

Milwaukee, Wis, April 24-The golden jubilee of St. Mary's church, the oldest German Catholic congregation in the city, was celebrated here with impres-sive coremonies. Pontifical mass was celebrated in the morning by Archbishop Katzer, assisted by Bishop Schwebach, of La Crosse, and Bishop Messmer, of Green Bay. Delegations from every Catholic congregation in the city were

present. A cablegram was received from Rome giving the pope's blessing to the church and the constregation. Then followed a set-back for the troopers. The Matabeles charged in force and drove the advance guard back, and, being met by the main body of the Buluwayo force, fire was opened at about

400 yards on the Matabeles' position. This was kept up until broad daylight, when the advance was ordered back, in view of the fact that too much ammunition was being wasted.

Up to this time the loss on either side had not been heavy, although the Mainbeles had by far the worst of it.

Just previous to the advance on the Matabele position two rapid fire guns were again set to work, and for about a quarter of an hour they were seen to sweep the Matabele position in front of the British force.

When the right moment seemed to arrive, a charge was ordered, and there was a prolonged period of sharp fighting at close quarters. Pistols, rifles, shotguns, warclubs, spears and knives claab-

ed prettily. Gradually the Matabeles pressed one

ward by sheer force of numbers, simost surrounding the British, who, to avoid being encircled, retreated, fighting foot by foot, but being driven steadily backward. One squad for a time was quite cut off, and only extricated intself by a brilliant charge through the Matabeles. Eventually the British were hard pressed and gave ground fast; then, rallied by Napier and Duncan, they again assumed the offensive and drove back the swarma of natives under a well directed fire. 
dered and the British retired toward Bul-UWBYO.

The loss of the enemy is said to have been very great. No correct estimate could be made. Reports place the num-ber of Matabeles killed at between 400 and 1,000. The loss of the British force is not stated, but it is believed to be more severe than the commanders at Bulu-wayo are willing to admit.
