Copies of the amended rules and regupervising inspector general of the steamat inspector service of the treasury department, at Washington, February 19, have been received at the local customs Amendments were made rules 1, 2, 3, 5 and 9, and now have the force of law. Pollowing is a brief re-sume of the amendments and new rules: new method of ascertaining the tensile strength and quality of steel plate; the test expected of all marine boilers ma-terial; the experience required of all eng the marine engineering service; for the filing of descriptive blue prints of marine engines for government approval; the grades of all marine engineers struck off the old list; the number of lifeboats required according to a ves-sel's tonnage. All steamers having bollsel's tonnage. All steamers having boll-ers extremely heated shall have a clear space not less than six inches between the belier and woodwork on the sides and four inches on top. All bidlers placed in vessels hereafter shall have a clear space of at least eight inches be-low the cylindrical shield and the floor to be less than the same and or keelson. Tubes, water pipes and steam pipes made of steel by the Bea-semer process shall not be allowed in marine bollers built after July 1, 1896. for shall any tube increased in thickness by welding one tube to another be allowed after that date. Steel known as the Bessemer process shall not be allowed in construction of marine boilers.

ONE HUNDRED PLUNKS.

Such Was the Fine Imposed upon C. W. Pierson, a Vagrant.

There was but one case in the police court yesterday, but he was fined enough to make up for any possible absentees. The man's name was C. W. Pierson, and he was arrested Sunday night by Officer Sinnett, and lodged in jail on a charge Afterwards he was charged with vagrancy.
