FORTIFICATIONS BILL IS PASSED

But Only After an Important Amendment by Senator Gorman Was Voted Down. The Senator Voted \$100,000,000 Treasury Certificates, Redeemable at the Government's Pleasure—Immigration Measure Passed.

IMMIGRATION BILL PASSED

Washington, May 20.—After three days of debate the house today, by an overwhelming vote of 195 to 28, passed the Harbord-McCall immigration bill, modified by the Corliss amendment. The bill as passed adds to the classes of aliens excluded from admission to the United States all male persons between the ages of 16 and 30 years (except parents of persons living in this country) who cannot both read and write English or some other language.

NEW HAMPSHIRE FOR SOUND MONEY

Democratic State Convention in Session at Concord Declares for Gold Standard.

IOWA DEMOCRATS AND SILVER

State Convention at Dubuque Declares for the White Metal in Large Quantities—Booming Association Is for Gold.

THESE ARE FOR SILVER

Dubuque, Ia., May 20.—The Democratic state convention today adopted the following declaration on the financial question: The Democracy of Iowa in convention assembled, hereby reaffirms its allegiance to the time-honored Democratic doctrine of bimetallicism; to the use of both gold and silver as the standard as primary money, and the coinage of both at a rate without change or limit. We hold to the use of both gold and silver as the standard money of the country and to the coinage of both gold and silver without discrimination against either metal or charge for mintage.

HARCOURT DENOUNCES RHODES

Attacks the Government for Allowing Him to Remain in the Privy Council. London, May 20.—In an address at Tredegar, county of Monmouth, Sir William Harcourt, leader of the opposition in the house of commons, attacked the government for allowing the retention of his membership in the privy council by Mr. Cecil Rhodes, whose conduct in connection with the recent conspiracy in the Transvaal, the speaker declared, had thrown the whole of South Africa into a state of confusion and danger. Sir William also denounced the British South Africa Company for retaining an agent who was shown to be guilty of gross fraud.

MORE MILITARY POSTS

Seattle, May 20.—A special to the Post-Intelligencer from Washington says: Captain William L. Robinson, assistant quartermaster, now on duty at San Francisco, has been ordered to come to this city as soon as he can be relieved, to take charge of the construction of a military post at Magnolia Bluff. Captain William H. Miller, assistant quartermaster, now at Fort Riley, Kansas, has been ordered to Spokane to take charge of the construction of a post there.

METHODIST CONFERENCE

Cleveland, May 20.—The committee on the state of the church of the general Methodist Episcopal conference will adjourn the conference to request Bolivia, Peru, Chile and Ecuador to remove the constitutional discrimination against missionaries of these countries making by legal. The committee again took up the resolution asking for the insertion of the name of Deity in the United States constitution, and voted it down.

ANGLO-AMERICAN UNION

Mr. Chamberlain Hopes the Two Nations Will Continue in Peace. London, May 20.—Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, secretary of state for the colonies, in an address at the convalescent memorial window in Cordwainers' hall, London, today, said that England lost the American colonies which now form the United States by mistakes which would not be repeated.
