Movements of Vessels at Home
and Elsewhere.

days ago she started again for San Fran-
cisco, but the heavy gale which drove
the battleship Oregon to the shelter of
Santa Cruz again held her back and she
made for Santa Barbara. Captain
Lindsay telephoned to Breckels on Sat-
urday afternoon that it was impossible
for him to make San Francisco in the
present condition of the Casaria and
asked for a tug to bring him home. It
is expected the Fearless and her tow
will arrive here about Wednesday noon.

The schooner Gem is on the way up
from San Francisco to load lumber in
Portland.

The steamer Arcata sailed Thursday for
this port from San Francisco. She will
touch at Coos Bay.

The schooner Mary Gilbert arrived to-
day from San Francisco with a cargo of
copper ore. The vessel had one of the
longest trips on record, and at one time
her crew were suffering for want of pro-
visions. The Mary Gilbert left San Fran-
cisco ninety-nine days ago, and after
being out thirty-five days was compelled
to put into San Antonio on account of
rough weather. She remained there sev-
eral days, and it was thirty days before
she reached Escondido, in Lower Califor-
nia, into which port she ran to get
away from the storm. She put into
Port Harford to replenish her stock of
provisions, and after leaving that place
was driven into Santa Cruz for shelter
from the north-west wind. From Santa
Cruz she was two days in reaching port.

The Oriental liner Altmore arrived yester-
day morning from Hongkong and Yoko-
hama. The cargo consisted of the fol-
lowing: 181 mats rice, 23 cases Chinese
tea and 1 case Joss sticks for Victoria;
11 cases straw hats, 1 case silk goods,
100 cases of various goods, 1 case
sample curios, 100 bales hemp, 100 bags
rice, 23 packages merchandise, 23 pack-
ages fire crackers, 100 cases petroleum,
23 cases curios, 1 package samples, 70
tons Japan coal, for Portland.
