The crew of the Republic, who were brought to this city appear three were brought to this city some three weeks by the Hollinwood, after their ship had been burned at sea, had been unable to save any of their effects on account of the hurry of their departure and the high sea which prevailed at the time they took to the boats. Conse-quently when they landed here they were without means, clothing or the neces-saries of life. Shortly after their instal-lation in the Sattors' Home a proposition, which appeared to be a very kind one, was made to the men as a means of helping them out of their difficulties. It was to the effect that they should appear in a realistic production of the loss of their bark at Sutro's bath's and receive in return 40 per cent of the money taken in upon a certain date. This was set for Baturday last and, the men, sixteen in number, entered into the spirit of the thing with the ardor of sallors, assist-ing in rigging up the sham vessels and making the necessary arrangements for det making the necessary arrangements for the affair. Upon the day set for the benefit there was not a very large at-tendance, but the beneficiaries went through their performance, and by re-quest repeated it twice on Sunday before thousands of people. 
