MATTERS MARINE.

Movements of Vessels at Home and Elsewhere.

The Earlscourt left up river at 3 o'clock yesterday morning. The Duxford sailed yesterday for Antofagasta, Chile, laden with 540,000 feet of lumber. The Fernbank arrived down yesterday afternoon and will put to sea in a day or two. The steamer Columbia arrived from San Francisco yesterday morning, with a full passenger and freight list. The schooner Francine, which left this port for San Francisco about a year ago, put in yesterday and will stop a day or two here on her way to the northern fisheries. The Big Bonanza yesterday shipped her crew and took on supplies for the voyage to Shanghai. She carries 1,079,000 feet of lumber. The captain, although anxious to put to sea last night was unable to do so. He will probably get off early this morning. The Utopia officers report that the N. A. C. Company's schooner Seventy-Six is undoubtedly lost with all on board. The schooner left Wood Island December 12 for Kyak and has never been heard from since, although the company's steamer Francis Cutting has since made thorough search for traces of her. She was in command of Captain Chas. Whittier; her crew consisted of Gustav Carlson, Nelson Davis, Frederick Chapman and Martin Johnson, and she carried as passengers Capt. H. B. Bowen and Otto Anderson, the two latter being residents of Wood Island, both of whom leave large families to mourn their loss.—Alaska Mining Record.

Mr. H. M. Stanley, M. P., in the course of a recent address before the Swansea Chamber of Commerce, said that the astonishing increase in foreign trade as compared with that of the United Kingdom, was due to the spirit of cosmopolitanism in commerce which is prevalent on the continent generally, and especially in Germany. The German devoted himself to learning foreign languages, methods and weights and measures, and endeavored, in intercourse with foreigners, to make himself as little German as possible. The Welsh, on the other hand, were inclined to attach undue importance to a narrow patriotism. The English were guilty of favoring branches of education which were of no use for commercial purposes. Another cause of loss of trade was British "fastness" and lack of adaptability. The British expected customers to come to them, while foreigners, by means of commercial travelers, went to the whole world and got business in this way, which otherwise would not have been obtained at all. The river continues to rise, with no apparent signs of abating for several days at least. The weather bureau report from Idaho Falls for the week ending June 16 has the following interesting comment on the situation in Idaho: "Cool nights have caused a gradual melting of snow in the mountains, and the streams are nearly stationary, or rising slowly; high water is still causing some anxiety in places where there is much liability to injury; the damage so far has been confined principally to bridges and roads. Teton river is overflowing its banks; the North and South Forks of the Snake river are bank full, and on the rise; the upper Snake is beyond its banks in many places, but still at Idaho Falls about five feet below the high water mark of 1894; high water still prevails in Wood river, and 250 yards of railroad track has been washed away in the vicinity of Gimlet, Blaine county; the Boise river remains high, and much damage has been done; in Washington county a considerable acreage of grain is under water, and rivers are still rising rapidly.
