And unless a remonstrance signed by the owners of three-fourths of the prop-erty fronting on said portion of said atreet be filed with the auditor and poe judge of said city within ten days from the final publication of this notice, to-wit, on or before June 20th, 1896, the common council will re-establish said grade as above proposed.
