THE CHILD IS BORN IN TACOMA

New Political Party Formed Which Will Heal All Branches in the Raaks.

FUSION OF ALL SILVERITES

State and County Tickets to Be Composed of Silver Men From Republican, Democratic and Populist Parties.

Tacoma, June 30.—A new political party was born in Tacoma today. It is called the "Free Coinage Republican Party of the State of Washington."

It is the outgrowth of a meeting of the state bimetallic league held here today. After its session the Republican bimetallicists present, to the number of nearly 100, representing twelve counties, met and organized a new party.

This organization will be effective until after the state convention of the new party. Its date and place of meeting will be determined by an executive committee of 24, one from each county.

Chairman Jones was authorized to appoint members for other counties, except King, where a free silver Republican convention will be held Thursday.

The meeting of the bimetallic league was attended by over two hundred, representing all parties.

CHANDLER SPEAKS

For McKinley and Silver, or Bimetallicism.

PREPARING FOR THE CAMPAIGN.

Washington, June 30.—Representative Babcock of Wisconsin, the chairman of the Republican congressional campaign committee, has returned from the St. Louis convention and is setting the machinery of his committee in motion.

Representative Babcock is very confident as to the result. He believes the Republicans will have no difficulty in electing a large majority of the members of the next house of representatives.

GENERAL CAMPOS SUSTAINED.

Madrid, June 30.—All the morning papers publish the letter to General Campos from his second, Marquis Miranda de Elio and Marquis Cabrinana, quoting the one addressed by them to General Borro's second, in which they state that—

"In view of the measures adopted by the government, conformably with the military and civil law and many other circumstances, deeming the honor and valor of Marshal Campos fully sustained, they consider any further prolongation of the situation indefensible by the laws of honor.

KILLED BY A TANDEM BICYCLE

Benjamin Coleman, a Wealthy Farmer, Is Run Down by a Man and a Woman on a Wheel.

Trenton, N. J., June 30.—Benjamin Coleman, a wealthy farmer, residing near this city, was thrown from his carriage last night, while endeavoring to get out of the way of a tandem bicycle.

He sustained injuries which resulted in his death before reaching his home. With Mr. Coleman in the carriage were his wife and little child, but neither one of the latter was injured.

London, June 30.—The bankruptcy division of the high court of justice today pronounced judgment of bankruptcy against General Phillip D. Roddey, who was a brigadier general in the Confederate army.

A TEN-MINUTE RESCUE.

Cape Disappointment, June 29, 1896.

Dear Sir: While on a drift at 12:15 this afternoon near Peacock Spit, for the Royal Chinoak, I was five minutes late in picking up, and caught an unexpected breaker, which completely turned the boat over, submerging both myself and partner, Carl Erikson.

I managed to gain hold of the upturned boat but was repeatedly washed off among booms, net, and oars, but succeeded in getting back to the boat without very much exhaustion, while Carl was driven about fifty feet away from the boat and tangled in the net without anything to buoy him save a few corks and was becoming exhausted from being repeatedly washed under. Thus while struggling with the elements a shout was heard, "Hang to it boys, we will save you."

DEAD OR ALIVE.

Fifty-nine Men Imprisoned in a Coal Mine.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., June 30.—There are fifty-nine men, living or dead, imprisoned in the depths of the doomed mine. This is the official number and there is no reason to think it is incorrect.

GOVERNMENT DEFICIT.

Large Gathering in Richmond Eulogizes Jefferson Davis and Secession.
