Herbert Warren and the siphon, created considerable excitement about the corner of 9th and Astor street yesterday. The boys take theirs in barrels now.

The handsome new life saving station at Fort Canby is now ready for the Corrugated iron roof. The boys will soon be able to occupy their new quarters.

The steamer Harvest Queen, which arrived down yesterday afternoon, brought eighty tons of fresh salmon from the fishwheels at the Cascades. The wheels of the up-river are apparently doing a rushing business.

The new time card put in effect as the result of the recent combine of the river boat lines, while giving the traveling public better service in many respects, does not improve the mail service between this city and Portland.

Mr. Chas. Gibbons yesterday evening brought in several more bunches of rye from his place which measured fully eight feet in height, and are magnificent specimens of what Clatsop county can do in the grain line.

Sam Roberts, of Olney, who has been fishing for trout during the past few days, sent in word yesterday that the basketful that he intended to send to his friends at the Parker House were so tempting that he ate them himself.

Contractor Goerli's men have commenced grading the stretch between Kinney's cannery and the Pacific Can Company. Captain Jacobson is driving the piles through the Telephone dock and soon the line through the city will be ready for the rails.

Mr. Stinecomb, who was run over by one of the grading teams at the head of Tenth street last week, was reported last night as being in a very low condition. The authorities at St. Mary's Hospital are afraid that he cannot live very much longer.

It is estimated that without any hurrying of the work, the grade for the first ten miles of the railroad above Tongue point, will be completed in six weeks or less. Paymaster Jones says that he was able, on his last pay trip, to walk over nearly the entire grade.

It was reported last evening that there was another case of the capsizing of another fishing boat on the Great Republic spit. The life saving crew from Fort Canby went to their rescue but the men were saved by fishermen who were near by. The names of the men in the boat could not be learned.

The circuit court is not very busy at

present. The only proceedings yesterday was the dismissal of the suit of F. A. Fisher vs. D. Morgan, upon motion of the plaintiff, and the submission to the court of the argument on the demurrer of the defendant in the case of John Lundborg vs. Neil O. Borglund et al.

In the police court yesterday afternoon the second chapter was read in the fight case between the Chinaman and the boy. This time the Chinaman was arrested at the instance of the boy, and as the evidence showed that John was being teased by a crowd of youngsters, and did not first seek trouble, he was discharged from custody.

An old river man stated yesterday that the condition of the channel was now such that large steamers like the Potter and Ocean Wave could only get into Ilwaco at certain times with the tides, and he thought that this fact would soon make Clatsop beach the more popular resort, particularly now that it is to have such good railroad service.

Captain Bendgard, of the Signal, stated yesterday that he was open to propositions for the placing of his steamer in the Alaska trade. He thinks that the cultivation of commercial relations between that country and Astoria and Portland will be highly profitable. It is, certainly to be hoped that the gentlemen who have negotiations under way in regard to this matter will be successful.

Mr. Sander, who was a passenger on the Columbia from San Francisco, arriving Monday morning, says that the trip was one of the most delightful he ever experienced. The weather was perfect, and out of the two hundred passengers, there was not one who missed a meal during the entire trip. They danced till midnight on the hurricane deck, and enjoyed the long days as only those can who are perfectly well and happy during a sea voyage.

A bad sailor on the Clackmannan-ship, which left up the river yesterday morning, gave Captain Thomson a deal of trouble. The man is a Malay named Grant, and after the ship had been out some two or three weeks he became insolent and disinclined to obey orders. Matters culminated when he attacked the captain personally, almost succeeding in doing him injury. The man was put in irons and retained a captive until the ship arrived in Astoria.

Harry Liberman, of Knappton, boat-puller for Fisherman Burnmeister, was yesterday afternoon taken with a fit while on the river with his captain. The boat was drifting at the time, and Mr. Burnmeister picked up the net by himself as rapidly as possible, and rowed to the city, arriving about 5 o'clock in the evening. Liberman was taken at once to St. Mary's Hospital, where he died at 6:20. It was thought that he was suffering from an attack of apoplexy.

Clerks in the various stores are becoming a little impatient at the delay on the part of employers in making an agreement to close stores on the Fourth of July. As the employees of commercial houses have had no general holiday this year, it would seem a small thing that they should be given a day off on the celebration of the nation's birthday. Country customers can easily be notified in advance of the closing of the stores, and it is not probable that there will be much business done anyway. A number of leading merchants entertained such an opinion, but all cannot be brought into line.

Auditor Kuetner, of the A. and C. R. R. R., stated yesterday that the only thing that would prevent trains from being run into Astoria for the seaside business within the next ten days would be the failure of the steel rails to arrive. If the first ship does not put in an appearance soon, the company will place lighter rails on the bridge for temporary use. This is objectionable, however, as the driving and pull-

ing of spikes in the bridge timbers has a tendency to induce decay. Everything is being pushed as hard as possible on this part of the work and no lengthy delay will be permitted for lack of the new rails.

There is considerable talk in certain circles of bridging Young's River instead of establishing a ferry in order to make connection with the new Lewis and Clarke road. "The time for ferries has gone by," said Mr. L. R. Seeley. "A farmer's time is worth money and while the first outlay for a bridge would be considerably more than for a ferry, yet in the long run I am sure it would prove a paying investment. The district to be served is a rich one and sorely needs good roads and means of quick access to the city. Times are different now from what they used to be when comparatively few people resided in that territory and those were on the banks of the river where a boat could land at each man's barn. Now the majority of the farmers have to drive to the boat landing anyway, and if there was a good road and bridge it would be cheaper and quicker to drive right into town."
