Doubtless the many advantages to accrue from such a school will be appreciated in this community, and a large patronage will support the school from the outset.
A number of the cannerymen report that more fish were caught in June this year than the same time last year, and that the number of fish caught the last half of June was twice as great as the number caught in the same period in 1905. The present is really the time between runs. The July run should not commence for a few days, yet, but it is noticeable that every cannery on the river is running and receiving a fair amount of fish. This is considered a remarkable circumstance by those familiar with the business.
Messrs. H. and J. H. Young, who have been visiting in the city from Newcastle, N. S. W., left up the river last evening on the Telephone. These gentlemen are the owners of a large sheep station in Australia, where they are herding about 60,000 head of merino and other fine grades of sheep. They are in this country looking over the situation and will visit the Sound and the East before returning home. They expressed themselves as being very much pleased with Astoria and the harbor of the Columbia. They report that the crop of wool in Australia will be short this year as compared with last year.
The Rev. Mr. Short, who has just returned from Portland, reports that the diocesan convention held there was a marked success. The attendance was unusually large, and great interest was manifested on all sides. New plans were inaugurated which will tend to strengthen the church and increase its efficiency. The jubilee service, which was held Sunday in Trinity church in honor of Bishop D. Wistar Morris, he says, was one of the grandest services which he ever attended. The church was packed with representative people of Portland and the outside districts, and together with the different bishops officiating, and the extra musical service, made the occasion one to be long remembered in the history of the church in Oregon.
In Justice Abercrombie's court yesterday, the case of the state of Oregon ex rel E. Rogers, Portland, vs. Walter Cooper, came on for hearing. Cooper has been acting as porter at the Parker House for some time past. Yesterday Mr. Rogers happened in there and saw Cooper wearing a pair of his trousers. Word was sent to the chief of police, who arrested the man, and when his room was searched, other articles of clothing and overcoat, blankets, etc., were found. They were claimed by Rogers. The court placed the defendant under \$500 bonds to appear before the grand jury. Rogers claims to have lost the articles last April. Cooper claims to have bought them from other parties. It was understood that the chief of police of Portland has other charges against Cooper.
At 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon a bill alarm was turned in from the corner of 6th and Astor streets. The roof of the China washhouse located on Judge Bowly's property caught fire from the stovepipe and a lively blaze was soon in progress. M. J. Kinney saw the smoke and rushed around to find an alarm box, but finding in this, telephoned the department and in six or seven or eight minutes a hose cart was on the scene. Unfortunately, through a misunderstanding, the firemen thought the blaze was at Booth's cannery, and first started in that direction. Then they were told it was at Kinney's cannery, and they switched off to the right place. Little damage was done by the fire. The Chinamen

NOTICE OF VOTE ON SWINE RUNNING AT LARGE.
Office of the County Clerk of Clatsop County.
