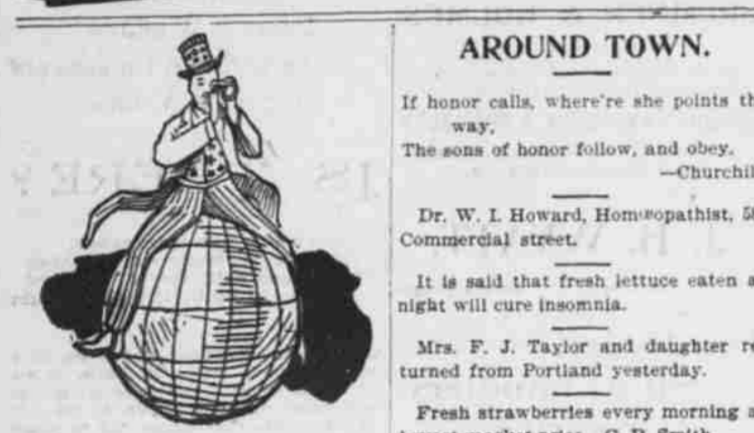

The weather yesterday was exceptionally fine and Uncle Sam deserves a premium for having favored Astoria's Fourth of July. In the afternoon there was just wind enough from the west to make a few whetcoaps on the bay, and the view was particularly fine owing to the clearness of the atmosphere.

Auditor Keutner, of the A. and C. R. R. R., yesterday finished putting in the switch at Warrenton for the Flavel branch. The track will be finished, barring accident, on Tuesday, and thereafter all traffic to Seaside will be handled via Flavel instead of the old bridge as at present, until the rails are laid across the new bridge.

The football game at Ilwaco yesterday was a very lively one. The match was between the first team of the Ilwaco, and the second team of the A. P. C.'s. The home boys were considerably out-classed, but the score of 2 to 4 was not a bad one. Winn Crosby and the McKinnel Brothers, of the Astoria team, did some fine work, while Hunter McKenzie, another brother, with the Ilwaco team, made a splendid showing.

The good people of Warrenton have taken up the question of water supply for that town, and it is estimated that at the comparatively small cost of \$45,000 a system of water works can be put in from the falls of the Lewis and Clarke. This system will supply Warrenton, Flavel and New Astoria. A proposition, however, has been made to the Astoria Water Commission to build a main across the Young's Bay railroad bridge and supply the west side of the bay in that manner.

One of the most interesting cricket matches ever played on an Astoria field took place yesterday at Smith's Point. The Multnomahs, of Portland, and the Astorians, crossed wickets. The score stood at the end of the game 91 to 88 points, in favor of Multnomah. Lawrence, the giant of the Multnomah team, alone made three-quarters of the score. The home team could have easily beaten the visitors had the giant been sick. But, as this is the first game of the season, the Astoria boys will yet make their mark.

Mr. A. F. Powell, the well known civil engineer, had a peculiar experience a few days ago while visiting the railroad camps above Tongue Point. The foreman thought he had come there to work, and when he left, presented him with a time check for ten and one-half days at 15 cents a day, deducting \$1.56 on merchandise account, leaving the gentleman with one and one-third cents to his credit. The back of the certificate bore the inscription "Discharged." The amount was raised to \$1.03 and the check cashed. When Paymaster Jones got hold of it he thought something was wrong, and wrote Foreman Smith for an explanation. Smith replied that the man had good recommendations, but he proved to be a very poor worker except at meal times, and was sorry that he had paid him so large a salary. Powell will probably make himself known when visiting railroad camps in future, and it is a question whether the joke is on Paymaster Jones or Engineer Powell.

NOTICE OF VOTE ON SWINE RUNNING AT LARGE. Office of the County Clerk of Clatsop County. In accordance with Section No. 3415 of "Hill's Annotated Law of Oregon," notice is hereby given that at a general election held June 1st, 1896, 1547 votes were cast against swine running at large; that in sixty days from the date of this notice it will be unlawful for swine to run at large, within Clatsop county, State of Oregon, under penalty of Five Dollars for the first offense, and Ten Dollars for each subsequent offense, to be recovered from the owner of the swine by civil action in the name of the State of Oregon, before a Justice of the peace of the precinct in which such owner or keeper, or either of them, may reside; and such penalty shall be for the benefit of, and when collected paid into, the common school fund of the county in which said action is brought, within sixty days after such animal is proved to be at large.
