KOPP'S NEW BUILDING.

Machinery for the Entire Plant to Come from Chicago.

John Kopp's new brewery and its adjacent buildings are rapidly nearing completion. The cold storage, ice storage, ice factory, machinery and boiler houses are now all complete. In the engine room the concrete foundation laid on piles, is now above the second story, and so far 125,000 brick have been laid in its walls. An elevator run by a donkey engine is used to carry the material to the upper floors.

Superintendent Nicoll and Contractor Surprenant are very busy men just now. The class of work put up by those gentlemen is too well known to need comment. Architect Schacht, who is now acting as his own superintendent, while Mr. Nicoll is completing the details of the plans for the Ilwaco building, says that he has never seen better work than is being done on the Kopp plant. When finished the brewery will have a capacity of 300 barrels per day. All of the storage houses, offices, barns and other buildings of the plant are complete in every detail. Mr. Schacht yesterday received a telegram from Chicago stating that the entire machinery plant for the brewery would be shipped next week.

THE NEW PILE DRIVER.

The successful casting by the Astoria Iron Works on Thursday afternoon of a 4000-pound hammer for a pile-driver has caused considerable favorable comment in the city.

The inventor of this peculiar style of hammer is Mr. Joseph Munro, of Astoria, who holds United States letters patent No. 531,859, dated December 24, 1895, covering his invention. Mr. Munro was greatly disappointed in not being present when the huge casting was made, but is entirely satisfied with the result. This is the first hammer cast for actual service since he received his letters patent, and Mr. Munro ordered it for use by Contract- or Sanderson, who will make a thorough test of the new invention. Mr. Munro claims that his invention will drive a pile perfectly straight and that vibrations of the stick during the driving process will be prevented, that faster work can be done, and that danger of splitting the pile is avoided.

Contrary to the information given out yesterday, hammers of this exact construction have not been in use heretofore, although attempts have been made to accomplish similar results.

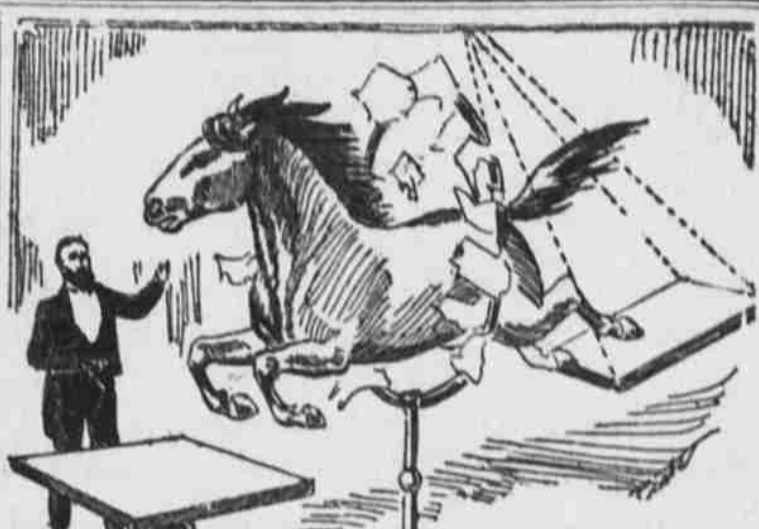
