THE PHILADELPHIA.

One of the most remarkable runs ever made from Portland to Astoria was accomplished yesterday by Pilot Patterson with the United States war ship Philadelphia. The captain left Portland at 8 o'clock in the morning and arrived at Astoria at 3:45 in the afternoon. Not a single stop was made on the entire trip, and the big war vessel beat the river boats down leaving an hour ahead of her.

Much to the regret of Captain Cotton, the Philadelphia was obliged to anchor in the lower stream of Elmore's cannery, instead of immediately opposite the city. Had the stream been clear Captain Cotton would have come to anchor near the O. R. and N. wharf, but as that berth is occupied, and there was no time to make other arrangements, he took the next best berth available.

In the evening Mayor Taylor and Dr. M. M. Walker paid Captain Cotton a visit on board his magnificent vessel, where they were delightfully entertained for an hour or more by the captain and his corps of officers. Admiral Beardslee is not with the ship, having gone overland to Seattle. It being his intention to join his flagship at Port Angeles. Captain Cotton especially requested Dr. Walker to say that he would be most happy to receive any and all who desire to visit the Philadelphia between the hours of 10 and 2 today. The officers will take great pleasure in showing visitors over the ship and explaining the guns and machinery. If Captain Cotton is well enough he will come ashore some time during the day to return the call.

FROM BOSTON.

In writing to an Astorian yesterday, Mr. L. T. Bradford, of the Boston Investment Company, Boston, Mass., said among other things:

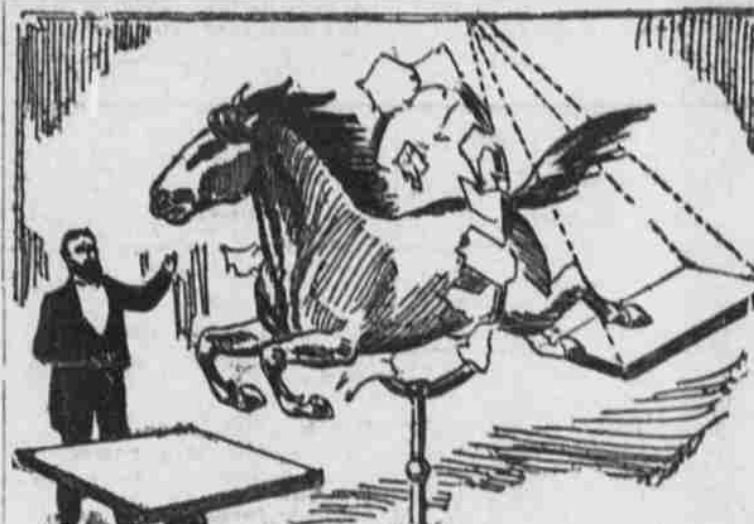
