### RYAN THE WINNER

Wilson Put Out by a Terrific Right Hand La Blanche Swing.

The Local Man Proves Too Much for the Latecomer, and Gets Him in a Short Round.

A crowd of about 300 people assembled at the Louvre last night to witness the ten-round go between Jim Ryan, champion middle weight of Oregon, and Oscar Wilson, of San Francisco. Ryan's seconds were Jack Hill, John O'Brien and Willard Young, while Mick Stafford and Arthur Young were behind Wilson. The men entered the ring at about 140 pounds. Jim Ryan, champion of Australia, acted as referee, and Jack Grant as time-keeper. The fight lasted almost one round. Ryan assumed the offensive at the call of time and, after sparring for a few moments, rushed Wilson. The latter got a pretty stiff punch in the face. Wilson made several passes at Ryan, but the Astoria boy got away nicely each time. Then Ryan tried a La Blanche swing, but fell short. Soon after he repeated the swing, Wilson catching it on his glove.

Ryan was smiling all the time and would give his opponent an opening, only to get out of the way. He did this several times. Time for the first round was about to be called when Ryan made another La Blanche swing at Wilson, catching him fairly on the chin. Wilson struck the floor like a ton of brick. He lay still for a moment, and then tried to regain his feet, but was too weak. He managed finally to arise, as which Ryan rushed toward him. His seconds pulled him away. Wilson fell up against a post, and held onto the ropes till ten seconds had been counted.

The knock-out blow was terrific and raised Wilson off his feet. The fight was one-sided and Ryan could doubtless have put his man out before he did.

### SPANISH TROUBLES

Uprising in the Philippine Islands Causes Alarm.

Reinforcements Sent to Cuba—Effort to Get at the Bottom of the Supposed Republican Plot.

(Copyrighted, '96, by Associated Press.) London, August 22.—The developments of the troubles of Spain are followed here with considerable interest. The outbreak in the Philippine Islands is regarded as seriously increasing her difficulty, and the news of a conspiracy has caused great excitement in Madrid, where it is stated that the government is considering the advisability of promptly reinforcing the Spanish garrison. The outbreak, however, is not a surprise to the government officials, as the news reached them some time ago of considerable activity on the part of the half-breeds. The object of the conspirators is to secure the independence of the Philippine Islands. The embarkation of reinforcements to the islands commenced today. The Spanish police are extremely active in the towns throughout the country just now in endeavoring to get at the bottom of the supposed Republican plot to cause an uprising by exciting the masses who opposed the departure of further troops for Cuba. Domestically visits have been paid to houses and clubs and prominent Republicans, and in many cases compelling documents have been made. Numerous arrests have been made among Republicans and great precautions are being taken in Madrid and other large cities.

### NORTHERN PACIFIC

Final Act in the Reorganization Made Yesterday in St. Paul.

St. Paul, August 22.—The final act in the reorganization of the Northern Pacific is to be noted in the issuance of a circular by the receivers stating that on August 21 they will turn over the property to the new company. The circular issued by President Winter gives the list of officers chosen by the board of directors (office of vice-president being left vacant) as follows:

Edwin W. Winter, president, St. Paul; Chas. S. Cooney, secretary, New York; Geo. H. Earl, assistant secretary, St. Paul; Albert E. Little, treasurer, New York; Chas. N. Clark, assistant treasurer, St. Paul; John Scott, comptroller, St. Paul; J. W. Kendrick, general manager, St. Paul; Wm. H. Phipps, land commissioner, St. Paul; Thomas Cooper, assistant land commissioner, Tacoma; G. S. Fernald, tax commissioner, St. Paul.

General Manager Kendrick has appointed his full list of subordinates, who are the same as before the receivership. Chief Engineer Melleny also announces his division chiefs, while General Counsel Burns re-appoints the division counsel, except at Tacoma, where Crowley and Grosscup become division counsel for the Pacific coast. W. G. Pearce, for some time assistant to the general manager in this city, is appointed assistant general superintendent with entire jurisdiction over the lines west of Billings, Mont. Various other circulars, already issued or soon to be issued, continue in office the present subordinates in all other positions.

### TO ISSUE CERTIFICATES.

Report Says New York Banks Will Come to the Rescue.

New York, August 22.—It is announced that the loan committee of the clearing house association will meet Monday morning, probably to issue some clearing-house certificates.

J. Edward Simmons, president of the Fourth National Bank, is quoted as saying that out of the political situation there has arisen a good deal of apprehension on the part of the general public and this has brought business to a condition of almost utter stagnation.

"Mills," Simmons added, "are being closed all over the country or else put on half time. There has been a little or no demand for goods and a very restricted sale. As a result, the strain upon merchants is becoming intense, and the resulting pressure upon the banks for discount is most severe. This coming at a time when the demand for money for crop moving purposes, as is usual at this season of the year, it is only right that the banks of New York should extend such accommodation to their out-of-town customers as well as to merchants, as will enable the crops to move freely."

"It will only be with a view of avoiding serious disaster that clearing house certificates will be issued should the emergency be considered sufficient in the opinion of the committee to warrant such action."
