GREAT FAKE IS EXPOSED

(Continued from First Page) went down on its hands. And the people have been taxed to pay for that loss, you and me—we have paid for it over one hundred million dollars. Meanwhile the government had to go on buying. Nobody wanted the dollars it bought and coined; for out of the 400 million dollars that have been bought and coined, three and a half hundred million are stacked up today idle in the treasury vaults. Is it any wonder that the nation could not stand such a policy for long? Is it any wonder that the provisions of the Sherman act which compelled these purchases were repealed in 1897? Is it any wonder that the silver mine owners opposed that repeal? And what is it that they want today? They want not merely a certain number of million ounces to be bought of them each month. They want 'free and unlimited' coinage. They want to be allowed to take all their silver to the mints and have it coined, no matter whether they work their men ten hours a day or twenty-four—no matter whether they produce \$20,000 an hour or \$200,000. Wage-earners, when any man talks to you of the "crime of 1873," quote these facts to him. Let him know that you are no fools. Remember that unlimited coinage of his silver means 50-cent dollars for you. Tell him that his talk of a "crime" is an insult to your intelligence. Tell him that you know the truth—how twice already, by the strength of his lobby and the use of his wealth, he has compelled the government to help him to put an artificial price on his product—a price which was paid by you and all the people in taxes—a price which came near to wrecking the nation's credit once, and which will never, with your help, have a chance to do it again.
