COUNTY ROADS. Comments of an Observer on the Necessity of Good Roads and Bridges.

Astoria, Sept. 28, 1896. To the Editor:—I have noticed in your paper under the subject of good roads, that it has been suggested that a bridge be built across Young's River in stead of a ferry to connect with the Seaside wagon road.

This, in my opinion, is a wise move, and should meet with the hearty co-operation of every resident of the city and county. Such a bridge will give much better facilities for traffic than a ferry possibly could, and will be much more permanent in character.

Since the site of the bridge has not been designated, I would suggest that it would best meet the requirements of all to locate it where it will do the largest amount of good for both country and city people. Some people favor putting it about a mile beyond Williamsport, but it seems to me that this is rather out of the way, and in fact a bad location.

In order to utilize the new roads, both the Lewis and Clarke and the contemplated city street improvement, a bridge should be built on a direct line so that the travel will be brought directly through the center of the city. This may be accomplished in two ways: First, put the bridge near the mouth of the slough on the Hess farm; or, run it west by the Hess residence, across the slough into the Nowlen tract, and from there connect the bridge to Fairfield or to a connection with Lafayette street. The latter is by far the better plan for several reasons. It serves the interests of the city better than any other scheme, and meets the requirements of the country people as well as any other plan. It is most desirable to have the road as short and direct as possible. In future years a motor line as well as wagon roads, can be best accommodated on the short line. It may cost more at the beginning to build a road and bridge in first class shape, but in a very few years the profits and advantages of such a line will be more than realized. It is a business proposition and we ought all of us to look at it in this light. Realizing the coming greatness of Astoria, we should be ready now to hasten forward every possible improvement and do everything in our power by hard work to serve our immediate needs by a class of improvements which will be good for all time.
