PROCEEDINGS OF COUNTY COURT

Large Amount of Routine Business Transacted and Bills Paid.

OUR COUNTY ROAD MATTERS

Claims Presented, Audited and Ordered Paid Out of Appropriate Funds—Official Record Compiled by F. L. Dunbar, County Clerk.

Official Report.

In the County Court of the State of Oregon, in and for the County of Clatsop, Wednesday, October 7, 1896. First day of October term.

Present—Hon. J. H. D. Gray, Judge; C. Peterson and Howell Lewis, Commissioners; F. L. Dunbar, Clerk; and Jas. W. Hare, Sheriff.

Court met and was duly opened at 10 o'clock a. m.

Comes now William Johnston, and presents the petition of himself and fourteen others, to locate a county road as follows, to-wit:

Commencing on the county road, in District No. 12, at a stake marked "R" 243 rods east, of the 10-mile post, from Jewell to Vesper; thence northeast to an alder tree marked "R" 50.60 north from the township corners of sections 5 and 6 west; also to commence at a vine maple marked "R" 25 rods south from the northeast corner of section 12, in township 5.4 (this being a terminus of the road in Columbia county); thence running northwest 190 rods to connect with said road. And also at this time is read the remonstrance of Chas. Oschaner and fourteen others against the location of said road. And it appearing to the court that several of the petitioners for said road have withdrawn, and the remonstrance contains a greater number of names than the petition, it is ordered that said petition be not granted.

In the matter of establishing a county road as petitioned for by D. Tweedie et al. Now at this time is presented the report of the viewers in the above road, and the same having been read and it appearing therefrom that said viewers have deviated from the route petitioned for, and the Court is in doubt as to the legality of said report, it is ordered that the report be referred to J. A. Eakin to report as to the legality of said road as changed by said viewers, and as to whether the viewers are entitled to pay.

Petition from H. F. Fisher and Peter Olson read, recommending that Mrs. Mary Nordlund be granted relief from the county, she being in destitute circumstances, and without means or property. Ordered that \$6 per month be granted said Mrs. Mary Nordlund.

Now comes August Davidson, supervisor Road District No. 14, and asks that his district be granted \$16, to build two bridges. Ordered that same be granted.

Now comes G. W. Fisher, keeper Walluski bridge, and states that said bridge requires a chain, to be used when draw is opened, to prevent persons from driving through. Ordered that the chain used for old Lewis and Clarke ferry be furnished him for the purposes named.

In the matter of liquor license for J. F. Logan. Now at this time is presented a petition from 61 legal voters of Seaside precinct, to grant a license to Alex. Gilbert to sell liquors in less quantities than one gallon in said precinct for a period of three months, and also is presented a petition from said voters asking that said license be granted to H. F. L. Logan, he having purchased the saloon from Alex. Gilbert. And it appearing to the court that the petitioner has given notice by publication in the Weekly Herald, and has paid the treasurer the sum of \$100 for said license, and has filed a good and sufficient bond, and that no remonstrance against granting said license has been filed, it is ordered that the Clerk issue a license to said H. F. L. Logan to sell liquor at Seaside precinct, in less quantities than one gallon, for a period of three months.

In the matter of bridge across Skipanon creek. P. C. Warren reports that the driving of piling and building of trestle, and material used, are according to contract, and that he would prefer the Court to inspect the same, as it might be more satisfactory to all concerned. Ordered referred to Commissioners Peterson and Lewis to examine same tomorrow forenoon.

Now comes O. A. Cole and states that he has completed bridge No. 16, on the Elsie road, and asks that same be accepted and warrant issued to him for \$140, according to contract. And it appearing that said bridge is not fully built according to the specifications, and that \$10 should be deducted therefrom, it is ordered that a warrant be issued in favor of O. A. Cole for \$130, in payment of said bridge.

In matter of bridge across McEwan's slough. Now comes W. J. Ingalls and states that he has completed the above bridge in accordance with his contract, and asks that warrant for \$238 be issued to him in payment thereof. And it appearing that J. H. D. Gray has examined said bridge and reports that the same has been built in accordance with the specifications and contract, and recommends that same be accepted, it is ordered that said bridge be accepted, and warrants for \$238 be issued in favor of W. J. Ingalls, in payment of said bridge.

Petition of Sidney Dell for leave to redeem lot 1, block 139; lot 1, and east half of lot 2, block 124; lot 1, and east half of block 128, Shively's Astoria, from sale for taxes for year 1893, upon payment of taxes, cost and penalty. Granted and so ordered.

Communication from Mrs. W. W. Parker read, stating that Mrs. Packwood is in destitute circumstances and recommending that she be granted relief. Ordered that she be given an order for provisions to the amount of \$5.

In the matter of the Judges of election. It appears that W. H. Barker, heretofore appointed as judge of election for Astoria precinct, No. 7, does not reside within said precinct. It is ordered that John Peterson be appointed as judge of election for Astoria precinct No. 7.

Communication from Gus Gronell read, stating that he raised \$11 No. 9, on the Elsie road, in accordance with instructions, and that \$11 No. 11 has been completed according to contract, and offering to deduct \$23 from the price of \$11 No. 2; and requesting that same be accepted and warrant issued therefor. Ordered that Clerk notify said Gus Gronell that \$11 No. 2 will not be accepted until completed according to specifications, and it is further ordered that \$11 No. 9 and 11 be accepted and warrants issued in favor of Gus Gronell for \$16, in payment thereof.

Communication from M. Kenney, supervisor Road District No. 2, read, stating that bridge on county road, in section 22, township 5 north of range 3 west, has been completed by M. Kenney, according to contract. Ordered that the same be accepted and warrant issued in favor of Martin Kenney for \$50, in payment thereof.

of W. J. Ingalls, in payment of said bridge.

Communication from Mrs. W. W. Parker read, stating that Mrs. Packwood is in destitute circumstances and recommending that she be granted relief. Ordered that she be given an order for provisions to the amount of \$5.

In the matter of the Judges of election. It appears that W. H. Barker, heretofore appointed as judge of election for Astoria precinct, No. 7, does not reside within said precinct. It is ordered that John Peterson be appointed as judge of election for Astoria precinct No. 7.

Communication from Gus Gronell read, stating that he raised \$11 No. 9, on the Elsie road, in accordance with instructions, and that \$11 No. 11 has been completed according to contract, and offering to deduct \$23 from the price of \$11 No. 2; and requesting that same be accepted and warrant issued therefor. Ordered that Clerk notify said Gus Gronell that \$11 No. 2 will not be accepted until completed according to specifications, and it is further ordered that \$11 No. 9 and 11 be accepted and warrants issued in favor of Gus Gronell for \$16, in payment thereof.

Communication from M. Kenney, supervisor Road District No. 2, read, stating that bridge on county road, in section 22, township 5 north of range 3 west, has been completed by M. Kenney, according to contract. Ordered that the same be accepted and warrant issued in favor of Martin Kenney for \$50, in payment thereof.

Petition read from D. S. Buterbaugh, asking that duplicate warrants be issued to him for warrants No. 1187 for \$4, for No. 1189 for \$13, as the same have been lost and cannot be found, and it appearing that a good and sufficient bond has been filed herein, it is therefore ordered that the Clerk issue the warrants petitioned for.

Report of H. W. Weeks, overseer Astoria Road District for September, read and ordered placed on file.

Communication from Ed Banks, supervisor Road District No. 19, read, in regard to bridge across Little creek. Ordered that Clerk write him to furnish the Court a report of where he proposes to expend the balance of the road fund apportioned to his district.

Ordered that Court do now adjourn until tomorrow at 9:30 a. m.

Communication from Ed Banks, supervisor of Road District No. 19, read, stating that bridge across Big creek on the Knappa and Svenson road, has fallen down, and the residents request that line of road be changed at that point and a new bridge built, and that a new bridge is necessary. The court having considered the same, and on motion to build a new bridge, J. H. D. Gray voted aye, C. Peterson and H. Lewis voted no. Ordered that request for new bridge be not granted.

In the matter of bridge across Hill's slough. The commissioners having examined this bridge and reported that the same has been completed according to specifications and contract, it is ordered that said bridge be accepted and a warrant issued in favor of V. Sanderson Co. for \$268.75 in payment thereof.

In the matter of the establishment of a county road, as petitioned for by D. Tweedie et al. Now at this time is read the opinion of J. K. Eakin in this matter, and it appearing therefrom that the report of the viewers as filed is not sufficient to give the court jurisdiction to establish the road prayed for in the petition, and that the viewers have no claims for the work performed, as they failed to follow the route petitioned for, it is hereby ordered that the report of the viewers in the above entitled road be not approved or accepted.

Ordered that court do now adjourn until tomorrow at 9:30 a. m.
