Declaration of Principles OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY.

The Republicans of the United States, assembled by their representatives in National Convention, appealing for the popular and historical justification of their claims to the matchless achievements of thirty years of Republican rule, earnestly and confidently address themselves to the awakened intelligence, experience and conscience of their countrymen in the following declaration of facts and principles:

can policy of discriminating duties for the up-building of our merchant marine and the protection of our shipping in the foreign carrying trade, so that American ships—the product of American labor, employed in American shipyards, sailing under the Stars and Stripes, and manned, officered and owned by Americans—may retain the carrying of our foreign commerce.

Immigration Laws. For the protection of the equality of our American citizenship and of the wages of our workmen against the fatal competition of low-priced labor, we demand that the immigration laws be thoroughly enforced, and so extended as to exclude from entrance to the United States those who can neither read nor write.

Captain William Hayden is dead. His death was caused by coast fever at Itapeta, where his ship, the Wachusett, is now discharging lumber. The news came yesterday by cable from Champerno, says the Chronicle.

A device for locating sunken vessels has been invented by a Baltimore man, says the Ledger. It consists of a buoy to which is attached a long coil of rope, the whole loosely contained in a metal cage on the deck of a vessel.

The British ship Albion arrived yesterday, seventy-seven days from Newcastle, having had a very eventful voyage. August 1, in latitude 25 degrees south, longitude 167 degrees west, the ship encountered a very strong easterly gale, and Sunday, off the Farallones, a wind storm from the north-northwest carried away several of her sails.

Captain Morgan, of the British ship Andromeda, says the Call, has a curious story to tell about the manner of loading a ship with nitrate at Caleta Buena. "One man did the job," said he yesterday. "Each sack of nitrate averaged 250 pounds, and that fellow used to put into our hold about 300 tons a day. He was a customs official, and had to handle everything that went into the vessel. Each sack as it came from the wagon was placed on his shoulders, and he would then run along the plank and drop it on the deck. After that the crew had to handle it. That man carried aboard my ship over 2000 tons of freight in ten days, and then seemed anxious for more work. Of course the distance he had to carry the nitrate was not great, but then figure out the number of trips he made, and imagine how you would like the job. Just imagine a United States customs officer carrying 3000 tons of wheat aboard my ship in order to keep tally of what went into the hold."

In a communication to the London Times, of September 23, W. Leatham Bright, a prominent British ship-owner, has the following: Steamships under the Norwegian flag have increased from 395 with 246,669 gross tons in 1895-6. It is a well known fact that, owing to the doubtless well-meaning but altogether unnecessary restrictions of the board of trade, a British steamer is not allowed to carry as much as a foreign steamer by 300 to 300 tons. At the same time, Lloyd's insure a foreign steamer and class her without putting on any restrictive load line. There are today, I should say, 150 to 200 steamers under the Norwegian flag built by British capital, manned by Norwegian sailors, exempt from paying income tax.

Protective Tariff. We renew and emphasize our allegiance to the policy of protection as the bulwark of American industrial independence and the foundation of American development and prosperity.

Reciprocity With Other Nations. We believe the repeal of the reciprocity arrangements negotiated by the last Republican administration was a national calamity, and we demand their renewal and extension on such terms as will equalize our trade with other nations, remove the restrictions which now obstruct the sale of American products in the ports of other countries and secure the enlarged markets of our farms, forests and factories.

Protection to Sugar Producers. We condemn the present administration for not keeping faith with the sugar producers of this country. The Republican party favors such protection as will lead to the production on American soil of all the sugar the American people use, and for which they pay other countries more than \$100,000,000 annually.

Enlargement of the Navy. The peace and security of the republic and the maintenance of its rightful influence among the nations of the earth demand a naval power commensurate with its position and responsibility. We therefore favor the continued enlargement of the navy and a

Pensions for Veterans. The veterans of the Union armies deserve and should receive fair treatment and generous recognition. Whenever practicable they should be given the preference in the matter of employment, and they are entitled to the enactment of such laws as best calculated to secure the fulfillment of the pledges made to them in the dark days of the country's peril.

Foreign Relations. Our foreign policy should be at all times firm, vigorous and dignified, and all our interests in the western hemisphere carefully watched and guarded. The Hawaiian Islands should be controlled by the United States and no foreign power should be permitted to interfere with them.

Armenian Massacres. The massacres in Armenia have aroused the deep sympathy and just indignation of the American people, and we believe that the United States should exercise all the influence it can properly exert to bring these atrocities to an end.

Monroe Doctrine. We reassert the Monroe doctrine in its full extent and reaffirm the right of the United States to give the doctrine effect by responding to the appeals of any American state for friendly intervention in case of European encroachment. We have not interfered, and shall not interfere, with the existing possessions of any European power in this hemisphere, but those possessions must not, on any pretext, be extended.

Independence of Cuba. From the hour of achieving their own independence the people of the United States have regarded with sympathy the struggles of other American peoples to free themselves from European domination. We watch with deep and abiding interest the heroic battle of the Cuban patriots against cruelty and oppression, and our best hopes go out for the full success of their determined contest for liberty.

Wool and Woolsens. To all our products—to those of the mine and the field, as well as to those of the shop and the factory—to hemp, to wool, the product of the great industry of sheep husbandry, as well as to the finished woolsens of the mill—we promise the most ample protection.

National Arbitration. We favor the creation of a national board of arbitration to settle and adjust differences which may arise between employer and employed engaged in interstate commerce.

Free Homesteads. We believe in an immediate return to the free homestead policy of the Republican party and urge the passage by congress of the satisfactory free homestead measure which has already passed the house and is now pending in the senate.

Alaska Representation. We believe the citizens of Alaska should have representation in the congress of the United States, to the end that useful legislation may be intelligently enacted.

Sumptuary Legislation. We sympathize with all wise and legitimate efforts to lessen and prevent the evils of intemperance and promote morality.

Rights of Women. The Republican party is mindful of the rights and interests of women. Protection of American industries includes equal opportunities, equal pay for equal work and admission to the home. We favor the admission of women to wider spheres of usefulness, and welcome their co-operation in rescuing the country from Democratic and Populist mismanagement and misrule.

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
