The steamer Columbia sailed for San Francisco yesterday morning with a large freight list. The schooner Halcyon sailed yesterday with a cargo of 300,000 feet of lumber for Santa Barbara. The schooner Letitia, Captain Aspland, sailed yesterday for Guaymas, Mexico, with a cargo of 166,764 feet of lumber, valued at \$13,341, and 5,588 feet of piles, valued at \$277.90.

The Andra is not yet ready for sea, her captain having not yet come down from Portland. The cargo now in her hold, which was brought down from Portland, is 61,979 sacks or 123,958 bushels of wheat, valued at \$99,560. A large portion of the cargo was lightered, but has not yet been cleared. Her orders are for Queenstown or Falmouth.

A telegram was received yesterday from Coos Bay stating that the Arago was reported ashore in a heavy sea just outside the jetty at that harbor. The telegram did not state whether the vessel is the same one that left here on the 14th, or whether it is the coasting steamer of that name. But it is thought probable that it is the latter.

The United States cruiser Philadelphia got into port yesterday. Her destination is also uncertain. She came here from Puget Sound, but whether she will go to Mare Island or South America remains to be seen. In the meantime she swings to an anchor in Mission Bay, and keeps the Duguay Trouin company. "Is there any trouble down south?" is the general question asked along the front just now.—Call.

The Examiner of Saturday furnishes rather an incredible story. It is to the effect that the ship Spartan, which sails today for Australia, is a floating palatium. Her commander's name is Captain Polite, and the Examiner says he lives up to it. He wanted to ship a crew and the applicants numbered several score. It is asserted that a regular table d'hôte dinner, minus the wine, is served aboard in the forenoon every evening at two bells, and that the scene is illuminated with two parlor lamps, with pink tissue paper shades on them. In shipping a crew, Captain Polite always takes care to get one man who is an expert at playing the violin or accordion, in order that the mariners may enjoy music at their meals. On one voyage it is related that the only musician on board was a Swede who played the triangle, but the music passed off, or in pleasantly. Before Captain Polite sails the wharfinger and collector at Main street will give him a dinner and theater party.

The French warship Duguay Trouin will not remain in port after today. She was to have gone to Mare Island for a thorough overhauling, but the Venezuelan question seems to be no nearer a settlement then ever, and warships are in demand in South America. The ship was to have remained here a month, and after docking at the Mare Island yard a thorough overhauling was to have given her. Now, however, all this has been changed, and the vessel will sail for Guaymas this afternoon. None of the men have been given shore liberty, and the sailors are angry in consequence. Every man aboard is on waiting orders, and the chances are that the gunboat may trip her anchor and sail at a moment's notice.

The Duguay Trouin made a very pretty picture as she entered port a few days ago. The engines were under a slow bell, and Captain Bayle was making all the use possible of his sails. The departure of the Trouin without allowing the men shore liberty will spread consternation among the French colony.—Chronicle.

#### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

Cape Arago—New Fog Signal.—On or about September 15, 1896, a fog signal was established at this light station on the small island at the western extremity of Cape Arago, Oregon.

During thick or foggy weather a Dabbl trumpet will sound as follows: Blast of 5 seconds, silent interval of 5 seconds, blast of 5 seconds, silent interval of 4 seconds. The fog signal is located in the building recently erected, which is connected with, and just in front of, the tower. The building is a one-story cement brick structure, showing white with sandstone trimmings, and black roof. A one and one-half story double building, painted white, lead colored trimmings and brown roof, has been erected on the site of the old dwelling, which had become dilapidated. The present building faces south.

The tower, which originally was constructed of iron and consisted of a skeleton frame supporting the lantern, the upper part of the frame inclosed with iron sheeting, has been inclosed with brick inclosed so that it now shows white, and connected with the rear of the newly constructed fog-signal building. The charts have been corrected accordingly. # Declaration of Principles

## OF THE REPUBLICAN PARTY.

The Republicans of the United States, assembled by their representatives in National Convention, appealing for the popular and historical justification of their claims to the matchless achievements of thirty years of Republican rule, earnestly and confidently address themselves to the awakened intelligence, experience and conscience of their countrymen in the following declaration of facts and principles:

#### The Financial Issue.

"The Republican party is unreservedly for sound money. It caused the enactment of the law providing for the resumption of specie payments in 1875; since then every dollar has been as good as gold. We are unalterably opposed to every measure calculated to debase our currency or impair the credit of our country. We are, therefore, opposed to the free coinage of silver, except by international agreement with the leading commercial nations of the world, which we pledge ourselves to promote, and until such agreement can be obtained we believe the existing gold standard must be preserved. All our silver and paper currency now in circulation must be maintained at a parity with gold, and we favor all measures designed to maintain inviolable the obligations of the United States, and all our money, whether coin or paper, at the present standard, the standard of the most enlightened nations of the earth."

#### Pensions for Veterans.

The veterans of the Union armies deserve and should receive fair treatment and generous recognition. Whenever practicable they should be given the preference in the matter of employment, and they are entitled to the enactment of such laws as best calculated to secure the fulfillment of the pledges made to them in the dark days of the country's peril. We denounce the practice of the pension bureau so recklessly and unjustly carried on by the present administration, of reducing pensions and arbitrarily dropping names from the rolls, as deserving the severest condemnation of the American people.

#### Foreign Relations.

Our foreign policy should be at all times firm, vigorous and dignified, and all our interests in the western hemisphere carefully watched and guarded. The Hawaiian Islands should be controlled by the United States and no foreign power should be permitted to interfere with them. The Nicaragua Canal should be built, owned and operated by the United States, and by the purchase of the Danish Islands we should secure a proper and much-needed naval station in the West Indies.

#### Armenian Massacres.

The massacres in Armenia have aroused the deep sympathy and just indignation of the American people, and we believe that the United States should exercise all the influence it can properly exert to bring these atrocities to an end. In Turkey, American residents have been exposed to the gravest dangers and American property destroyed. There and everywhere American citizens and American property must be absolutely protected at all hazards and at any cost.

#### Reciprocity With Other Nations.

We believe the repeal of the reciprocity arrangements negotiated by the last Republican administration was a national calamity, and we demand their renewal and extension on such terms as will equalize our trade with other nations, remove the restrictions which now obstruct the sale of American products in the ports of other countries and secure the enlarged markets of our farms, forests and factories.

#### Monroe Doctrine.

We reassert the Monroe doctrine in its full extent and reaffirm the right of the United States to give the doctrine effect by responding to the appeals of any American state for friendly intervention in case of European encroachment. We have not interfered, and shall not interfere, with the existing possessions of any European power in this hemisphere, but those possessions must not, on any pretext, be extended. We hopefully look forward to the eventual withdrawal of the European powers from this hemisphere, and the ultimate union of all the English-speaking part of the continent by the free consent of its inhabitants.

#### Independence of Cuba.

From the hour of achieving their own independence the people of the United States have regarded with sympathy the struggles of other American peoples to free themselves from European domination. We watch with deep and abiding interest the heroic battle of the Cuban patriots against cruelty and oppression, and our best hopes go out for the full success of their determined contest for liberty.

#### Protection to Sugar Producers.

We condemn the present administration for not keeping faith with the sugar producers of this country. The Republican party favors such protection as will lead to the production on American soil of all the sugar the American people use, and for which they pay other countries more than \$100,000,000 annually.

#### Wool and Woolens.

To all our products—to those of the mine and the field, as well as to those of the shop and the factory—to hemp, wool, the product of the great industry of sheep husbandry, as well as to the finished woolens of the mill—we promise the most ample protection.

#### Merchant Marine.

We favor restoring the early Ameri-

can policy of discriminating duties for the up-building of our merchant marine and the protection of our shipping in the foreign carrying trade, so that American ships—the product of American labor, employed in American shipyards, sailing under the Stars and Stripes, and manned, officered and owned by Americans—may regain the carrying of our foreign commerce.

#### The Financial Issue.

#### National Arbitration.

We favor the creation of a national board of arbitration to settle and adjust differences which may arise between employer and employed engaged in interstate commerce.

#### Free Homesteads.

We believe in an immediate return to the free homestead policy of the Republican party and urge the passage by congress of the satisfactory free homestead measure which has already passed the house and is now pending in the senate.

#### Admission of Territories.

We favor the admission of the remaining territories at the earliest practicable date, having due regard to the interests of the people of the territories and of the United States. All the federal officers appointed for the territories shall be selected from bona fide residents thereof, and the right of self-government shall be accorded as far as practicable.

#### Alaska Representation.

We believe the citizens of Alaska should have representation in the congress of the United States, to the end that needful legislation may be intelligently enacted.

#### Sumptuary Legislation.

We sympathize with all wise and legitimate efforts to lessen and prevent the evils of intemperance and promote morality.

#### Rights of Women.

The Republican party is mindful of the rights and interests of women. Protection of American industries includes equal opportunities, equal pay for equal work and protection to the home. We favor the admission of women to wider spheres of usefulness, and welcome their co-operation in rescuing the country from Democratic and Populist mismanagement and misrule. Such are the principles and policies of the Republican party. By these principles we will abide and these principles we will put into execution. We ask for them the considerate judgment of the American people.
