The weather yesterday was all that could have been desired for an election day in Oregon, and was well in keeping with the weather reported from other parts of the country.

The government steamer Mendell came up from Fort Stevens yesterday after a large load of material, and incidentally to give the 123 employes on the works an opportunity to vote. It is stated on good authority that eighty of them voted for McKinley. Commencing the second Monday of January, 1897, and continuing four weeks, special courses of instruction for horticulturists and dairymen will be given at the state agricultural college, Corvallis. In some of the school rooms yesterday ballots were taken amongst the pupils and in every room McKinley had a large majority. In Miss Grant's room the vote stood, McKinley 49, Bryan 6; in Miss Sayre's room, McKinley 38, Bryan 6. Other rooms were in about the same proportion.

LATEST ARRIVAL FROM THE ORIENT The British Steamer Mount Lebanon in Port from Yokohama. BROKE HER PROPELLER SHAFT Had to Put Back for Repairs and Was Laid Up Ten Days—A Light Cargo for This Port.

The British iron steamer Mount Lebanon arrived in the harbor yesterday morning at 11:30 o'clock after a voyage from the Orient which was replete with reverses.

After leaving Hongkong on the 16th of September and touching at Amoy, Kobe, and Yokohama, the steamer sailed from the latter port on the 27th for the American coast, but had been out but two days when the propeller crank shaft became broken, though with some difficulty the crew were able to navigate her back to port in this disabled condition, where she lay up for repairs about ten days.

On the 12th of October the voyage was resumed, but a heavy sea was soon met and southerly to northwesterly winds encountered which increased in fury until the steamer tossed to such an extent that the cargo shifted. Fortunately only a minimum amount of damage was experienced from this. The steamer listed over to the starboard, which retarded progress somewhat and gave a rather ungainly appearance, but she had no difficulty in making port, though she was compelled to wait about twenty-four hours for a pilot.

While the steamer remained in the harbor at Yokohama, the Chinese vice-roy, Li Hung Chang, arrived on the Empress from Vancouver, and was met by his own steamer from China, which was sent over to convey him home. Li's presence in Japan was accepted without any particular manifestation on the part of the Japanese, which might indicate a more friendly feeling between the erstwhile hostile nations.

Among the cabin passengers on the Mount Lebanon were Dr. Johnson and Mr. Hochapfel, of Portland, who made the round trip with the steamer, and seemed much pleased with their voyage. There were four European passengers in the steerage and thirteen Chinese who will probably remain aboard until the return to Victoria where they will land.

The import cargo consists of about 1200 tons all told, made up of Japanese matting, and Chinese foodstuffs, tea, curios, and silk, mostly for Portland, but a portion consigned to Vancouver, B. C. This is a light cargo for a steamer of the carrying capacity of the Mount Lebanon, but is accounted for by the fact that exporters in the Orient are not inclined to risk shipments until the uncertainty of the conditions which might result from the election in the United States is passed.

After clearing at the custom house the Mount Lebanon went up to Portland yesterday afternoon in charge of Pilot Reed. today and bought two cigars, tendering in payment a half dollar; and what do you suppose the clerk did? "The slightest idea. What did he do?" "Gave me a quarter back."

The Republican Glee Club has been one of the best features of the Republican organization in this county. The club is composed of Messrs. One of the sights of the day yesterday was the Occident Hotel "bus," which drove to the polls with the proprietors and employes of the house. They were twelve in number, and each one was decorated with a large golden-colored chrysanthemum, the gift of Billy Edwards, who secured them in Portland. Without coercion or solicitation, the employes of the house early in the morning notified Messrs. Megler and Wright that they had all made up their minds to vote for McKinley, and wanted to go to the polls in a body, having decorated themselves for the occasion. The incident was a complete and most agreeable surprise to the proprietors of the house, and the bus was ordered out, all hands, including Messrs. Megler and Wright, taking a spin about town and finally plumping twelve straight votes for McKinley and good government.
