The best turkeys now obtainable are those raised on small farms.

A great deal of interest is being taken by local sporting men in the Fitzsimons-Sharkey fight, which takes place in San Francisco December 2. Many are of the opinion that the Australian will take Sharkey's head off in a minute, but there are many who think the sailor will successfully withstand Fitzsimons' terrific blows. The fight will be one of the best ever seen on the Pacific slope.

Section 12 of Ordinance No. 1294, page 173, of the city charter, reads as follows: "All vessels coming to dock shall rig in whippers; all vessels before coming to the dock shall rig in their jib-booms and whippers and bumpkins, and the lower and topsail yards be braced in sharp." Thus, when vessels are in the offing for several days, it may be expected that they are waiting for their whippers to grow. It is said the municipal assanensis drew up the ordinance, which defines the duty of the harbor master.
