Work is being resumed by degrees, says the Oregonian, on the Astoria-Goble railroad. More men are being put to work in the vicinity of Rainier, and operations on the heavy rock work kept for winter will soon be commenced. It is expected that a full force of men will be at work all along the line by the first of the year.

The plumbers and woodyard people are having a veritable picnic. The cold weather the last few days has frozen the water pipes all over town and made it necessary for the people to keep up hot fires in stores and residences. Some people say they like it, but the majority are of the opinion that unless the weather moderates there will be a great deal of sickness in the city.

The cold weather which has prevailed for several days, culminated yesterday morning in the coldest day of the season, as well as the coldest day ever recorded in November. Observer Grover says that the lowest November temperature in Astoria of which there is any previous record, is 39 degrees. The thermometer yesterday morning stood 19 above zero. There have been years when the thermometer registered lower in other months. In January, 1888, when the river was frozen over, the mercury stood at 10 above; in February, 1890, at 16 above, and in January, 1892, at 16 above.
