both to navigation and the accommodation of the public, and the petition asked for an extra levy to cover the expenses of the bridge, which was based on estimates made to be from \$5,000 to \$8,000. A special levy was made in accordance with the wish of the petitioners. Then comes the discussion of what kind of a bridge to build and what length of draw was needed. A very few claimed that a 90-foot draw in the clear was required in Young's river because the Potter was 65 ft. wide and sometimes she went through to Greenwood cemetery, and now the Potter, the widest boat on the Columbia, may have gone to Greenwood once a year, and perhaps twice, but I think a statement can be made without fear of contradiction that the Potter has not made one trip a year to Greenwood since the cemetery was opened, and when she did go one of the other company's boats could just as well have made the trip, and if there was no other boat in the river, the Potter could have made the trip through a 75-foot draw.

In the general discussion the court was all agreed that a steel draw would be the cheapest in the end, which no one denies, but a steel draw and a long span enhanced the cost far beyond the anticipation of the taxpayers, who began to make a kick. Then came a cry from several parties that own real estate in another locality that they have been holding for a term of years without improvement, waiting for some one to make improvements to enhance the value of their holdings, and now they think the county ought to bridge in their locality. What for? To boom their property, of course. With no road on either side of the river, and no visible means in sight to build one with. However, had the writer would like to see the bridge at the lower place, he cannot see any means at hand to build a road to it, and it is unprecedented for their court, or any other court, to bridge a stream, much less Young's bay, at a large expense where there is no road built on either side. It is the bounden duty of our honorable county court to bridge Young's river and connect this road that has cost so much money and labor, and if the taxpayers think a steel draw too expensive, and a ninety-foot span, build a wooden draw and trestle. I understand there are reliable parties that are ready to submit a plan for a good, substantial wooden draw and trestle with 75-foot span in the clear, and warrant the structure twenty years, for eight thousand dollars.

The Scientific American gives this recipe, which the whole world ought to know: At the first appearance of diphtheria in the throat of a child, make the room close, then take a tin cup and pour into it a quantity of tar and turpentine, equal parts. Then stir the contents with a red hot iron, so as to fill the room with fumes. The little patient, on inhaling the fumes, will cough up and spit out the membranaceous matter and the diphtheria will pass out. The fumes of the tar and turpentine loosen the matter in the throat, affording the relief that has baffled the skill of physicians.
