MARINE NEWS.

The steamer Coleman dragged her anchors in the storm yesterday morning.

A towboat will arrive down this morning to take the J. M. Coleman to Portland.

The schooner Coleman entered yesterday from San Francisco, with 109,000 feet of redwood for Portland.

A square-rigger was reported outside yesterday afternoon which is thought to be the British ship City of Madras.

The Laura May, Captain Hanson, entered in ballast yesterday from San Francisco. She will load lumber in Portland.

The schooner Albion, having finished her repairs at the Astoria Iron Works, was anchored in the stream yesterday afternoon.

The steamer Columbia, Captain Conway, arrived in from San Francisco at 4 o'clock yesterday morning, and left up for Portland at 6.

The steamer Truckee, which arrived down Friday and went to the lower anchorage Saturday, sailed for San Francisco Sunday morning with 200,000 feet of lumber.

Sunday the British steamer Chittagong, Captain C. R. Corfield, arrived from Hongkong and Yokohama. She left Hongkong December 10, and Yokohama January 2. She has two Chinese passengers for Portland and a full cargo, consisting of hemp, matting, silks, teas, and rice.

Some alarm has been expressed for the safety of the American schooner Laura Madison, 32 tons, Captain Hansmann, 79 days out from Salaverry, Peru, sugar laden for Vancouver, B. C., under charter to J. W. Grace & Co. The passage is said to be usually made in 40 or 50 days. The vessel and captain being owned by B. H. Madison & Sons, of San Francisco. She was built in 1882.

The schooner Janus, a two masted fishing smack which was moored at or near George & Barker's dock, yesterday morning broke away and smashed into the dock. Some damage was done to the dock and the schooner had her bow badly wrecked. She was afterwards towed down to the O. R. & N. dock and tied up for repairs. Later, it is reported, she was libeled for damages.

The barkentine Tam O'Shanter, which arrived in Portland Sunday evening and was towed to Knappton for lumber lading, early yesterday morning broke her anchor chains in the easterly gale and floated down stream. She crossed the channel near Fort Stevens in perfect safety, her sails were unfurled, and she glided down stream and out to sea past Fort Canby as though piloted by an old hand. She drove in the offing and in the afternoon was brought inside again. At 1 o'clock she was docked at the Parker house dock by the tug Relief.

Steamship Al-Ki sailed yesterday afternoon for Alaska with about 20 passengers and a large amount of freight. Among the passengers were a large number of theatrical people going to Juneau. Several miners who will work in the vicinity of Douglas Island, Berners bay, and other coast camps, were also aboard the ship. E. Hudson and son, of King county, were on the list bound for Berners bay. Mr. Hudson said they will work for the Noell Gold Mining Company, which has free milling quartz a mile and a half from the water, and which runs from \$8 to \$125 a ton.

Orion—Stuslaw River Entrance—New Survey.—A survey by the corps of engineers United States army, made in June 1893 of the entrance of the Stuslaw river shows such extensive changes that the present edition of the coast survey chart is no longer reliable, and vessels should enter without local knowledge or a pilot. The changes will be shown on the next edition of the charts.
