ALASKA EXCEPTED.

From the General Arbitration Treaty by Olney.

Chicago, January 29.—A special to the Daily News from Washington says: In a few days Secretary of State Olney, acting under instructions of the president, will send the senate a new treaty, signed by himself and Julian Pauncefote, designed to settle by peaceful co-operation the two great English speaking nations' real location west of longitude parallel 141, which by treaty and tradition establishes the boundary line between British Columbia and the United States.

The new treaty has two objects in view; primarily the peaceful settlement of the territorial dispute, but locally to pave the way in the senate for the ratification by that body of the new arbitration treaty, which is being opposed by several western and north-western senators because it is supposed by them to include the Alaskan boundary dispute. By the new treaty, or rather agreement, perfected after several conferences between Secretary Olney and Ambassador Pauncefote, the Alaskan dispute was to be excepted from the general arbitration treaty and made the subject of special investigation by a joint commission.

San Francisco, January 29.—William Robles was today sentenced by Judge Wallace to fourteen years in San Quentin for perjury. The crime of Robles was committed under unusual circumstances, in that his perjury was committed to save another from the penitentiary. Some months ago a woman named Aggie Abbott, was convicted of grand larceny for stealing a gold watch from the pocket of John Ellis, a countryman. At that time Robles was a prisoner in the county jail, charged with vagrancy. To save the Abbott woman, Robles made an affidavit in which he swore that he stole Ellis' watch and that the woman, then under conviction, was innocent. The attorney for the woman presented Robles' affidavit to Judge Bahrs in support of a motion for a new trial. Surprised at the contents of the affidavit, Judge Bahrs decided upon an investigation, which resulted in his denial of the motion and sentenced the woman to a term in the penitentiary. Robles was ordered into custody for perjury, and was subsequently indicted by the grand jury.

Lincoln, Neb., January 29.—Joseph A. Edgerton, the secretary of the national convention of the People's Independent party, has issued an address in reply to one recently made public by the national committee, G. W. Washburn, of Massachusetts. Washburn recommended that the Populists drop the fight for silver and take up the government issue of paper money and the government ownership of railroads. Edgerton says no change is needed in policy as these questions are identical in the Populists' general plan. The silver issue must not be abandoned.

Washington, January 29.—Referring to the action of the Nebraska legislature, instructing him to vote for the free coinage of silver, Senator Thurston said: "The present Nebraska legislature does not represent the party that elected me to the senate. When any of the legislators show a disposition to come to my proposition, I will consider the matter. We are now as far apart as the poles, and there is no apparent prospect of an agreement."

Lendville, Col., January 29.—A considerable reduction in the cost of maintaining the state militia here was made today by an order to abandon the headquarters at the Hotel Vendome. Tonight seventy-five men were ordered home, leaving 100 outside and 100 local men on duty. From what can be learned, all the troops will be sent home in a few days.
