The telegram from New York in yesterday's paper concerning the increasing traffic to the Orient via the Great Northern Railroad and Seattle, is a slight indication of what can be accomplished via Astoria when her transcontinental railroad connections are completed.

Our people should not be asleep now that the great Japanese empire is waking up no civilization and bidding for business on this coast. Don't wait until the railroad is done, but lay the lines now for an Oriental steamship trade.

The article appearing upon the question of the employment of criminals from our penitentiaries and jails, in the construction of country roads, deserves more than passing attention. Everyone knows that Oregon has the worst roads in the world, and if she can take lessons from New York and Texas in the economy of construction of public thoroughfares, let her do so by all means. Clatsop county is a little corner of the state, but she needs roads, how badly only the farmers can tell. Astoria and Clatsop also need other things more than they need roads. They need population, which will extend cultivation, work in the factories, and make the building of roads profitable. Let us have factories, population and roads.

That a seaport town like Astoria, with a population seventy-five per cent of which is foreign, gathered from the four corners of the earth, with the constant arrival and departure of ships whose crews frequently desert, and with the fact that in the season thousands of outsiders congregate here not only to legitimately engage in the fishing business, but others to fish the money out of the pockets of the hard-working men, should endeavor to cut down an already too small police force, is simply ridiculous in the extreme. Economy is all right in its place, and the guardians of the public monies are bound to exercise the same conservatism in their handling that they would in the conduct of their own affairs; but to throw open the portals of a cosmopolitan town like Astoria to rapine and robbery, is nothing less than suicidal, and a breach of the trust imposed in them by the people. The wages paid the police officers as well as other city officials are low enough, particularly in consideration of the present discount on city warrants, without any further reduction. The number of men employed to cover the large field is small enough, everyone knows. What can the police commissioners put forth in extenuation of their acts before a confiding public should they take sides with this present schoolboy movement?

CUBAN SITUATION.

The situation in Cuba as it is told today is contradicted tomorrow, and there is excuse for the bewildered state of the public mind, and for the populace to become irritated by the strain that is put upon them by imperfect, confused and antagonistic daily dispatches that should contain information, but are evolutions of imagination, says the Brooklyn Standard Union.

There are several able persons who might rise to a point of order and say by way of general explanation and admonition: "I am a pretty good liar myself."

The Cuban war is going on in the same old way. It is not a war of grand battles, of gorgeous military evolutions, and scientific strategy. It is a war of swamps and thickets, intensified beyond all that people know in the temperate zones by the tremendous luxuriance of vegetation that forms appalling ambushes, vast forests almost impenetrable, and easily converted into invulnerable fortresses. The life of the Spanish nation is poured out in the terrible thickets, under the tropical torrents of rain and the burning sun, and in the fearfully muddy roads, in vain. The one million rebels in Cuba cannot be conquered, and they have gone beyond a treaty with Spain that will leave her in command of Cuba in any fashion. This is the great fact, written in blood and ash, in the insurrection of '68-'78, and that of '95-'96-'97 as well.

That which we of the United States must look out for is that as Spain loses her grip, no other European power or group of powers catches on and organizes a West India League with the capital at Havana, to bolt the door of the

Mississippi Valley to the Southern seas. We are the overshadowing power of this hemisphere, and we want to hold the keys of the Mediterranean Sea of America, and we mean to do so. There are stories with some shadowy shows of things possible in the form of falsification rising from Cuba and Florida, that there are negotiations going on between our state department and that of Madrid, looking to reform and autonomy and all that sort of thing for Cuba. But the relations of Cuba with Spain can never be peaceable, except upon the basis of absolute political separation of Spain and Cuba, as plain as the ocean that divide the peninsula and the island. That is the only practical reform, and what we want is to help Cuba with money to rid herself of Spanish oppression and we hold the most page.
