The Norwegian steamer Florida, arrived down yesterday and went to sea.

The steamer Truckee arrived in from San Francisco yesterday in ballast and left up for Portland.

The steamer Alice Blanchard, Captain Hughes, arrived in yesterday from Coos Bay and way ports, with a large passenger and freight list, and left up for Portland last night.

Captain McCoy, superintendent of the Spirelock Company's tug, is remaining in the city to finish the repairs on the Relief. He expects to go to San Francisco within a few days.

The lighthouse tender Manzanita, Captain Gregory, arrived down from the buoy station yesterday morning, and is awaiting orders to go to Portland. The Manzanita will soon undergo extensive repairs to her hull, boilers and machinery. She has been in service for many years and now needs a thorough overhauling.

The reason that the British steamship Chittagong did not put to sea yesterday is the fact that instead of being anchored in the lower harbor she is ashore on the sandbank abreast of Elmore's cannery. Captain Corfield, who is now on his first voyage as master, is much chagrined over the matter, and lays the blame principally to the ship, which he says is an unlucky vessel and caused trouble to every captain who ever shipped in her. Captain Corfield was formerly first mate under the retiring captain, and in various ports the vessel ran aground and met with other accidents. In this instance he blames the pilot for anchoring his steamer too close to the banks. He says she was only given fifty feet swinging room on a high tide to begin with. It was arranged for the tug Relief to pull her off at high tide last night. If the efforts prove successful the Chittagong will go to sea this morning.

A circumstance is just reported which recalls to the public mind once more that thrilling event in English history—the mutiny of the Bounty. When the mutineers cast their captain and others of his crew adrift in an open boat, and themselves sailed off with the Bounty, they landed at Pitcairn Island. As years went by and they increased in number, they were removed to Norfolk Island where they are now located, and the administration of the place has been left in their hands. Reports of unsatisfactory administration of justice reached New South Wales, and an inquiry was made. Considering that the reports were too well founded, the New South Wales authorities decided to change the system of government and the last Australian mail brought particulars of the proceedings. Lord Hampton, the governor-general of New South Wales, in H. M. S. Katoomba, visited Norfolk Island, taking with him Colonel Spalding, C. G. M., who was installed chief magistrate. It was generally thought that some show of hostility to the new regime would be made, but nothing of the kind occurred. The leading man of the place was Mr. F. M. Nobah, and it transpired that the families of this man numbered over three hundred. The whole population of the island is not over six hundred, so that the Nobah family or families comprise half of the population. Strangers are practically excluded from the island, and at any rate not encouraged, and this, together with the great preponderance of the Nobahs, shows that there has been an intermarrying of a very undesirable nature. His Excellency Lord Hampton called a public meeting, and read the proclamation altering the constitution under which Norfolk Island was governed. This was received graciously by the islanders, and in their address they stated that the inhabitants of the Norfolk Island yielded to none in their devotion and love to Queen Victoria. Colonel Spalding was formally installed as chief magistrate, and the Katoomba left. The effective force to assist the new commissioner to compel obedience to the law consists of one policeman. Colonel Spalding was getting a committee of elders elected to assist him in governing the island—Liverpool Journal of Commerce.

A sea serpent, an electric storm and two waterpumps relieved the monotony of the American ship William F. Babcock's trip from New York to this city. The Babcock went alongside Howard street wharf yesterday and she had every appearance of a large yacht, being neat and clean from cabin to fore-castle. She is the finest appearing merchant vessel in the harbor. Captain Graham tells of experiences during the voyage. He saw a sea serpent, he says. It did not have the usually wild appearance attributed to most of the large reptiles reported in the Atlantic ocean. It was apparently nothing more than a huge snake. When seen it was lying on the water coiled up and seemed to be asleep. The ship was in latitude 8 degrees 48 minutes west, or about 400 miles from the mouth of the Amazon river. The serpent was plainly seen by the men on the vessel, which was sailing along at four or five knots an hour, and passed within ten feet of the ship. It was thirty or forty feet long and was of a green color with black spots. An electric storm was encountered by the Babcock in latitude 25 degrees 55 minutes north, longitude 37 degrees west. The wind was blowing hard and the squalls were so severe that it was necessary to reduce sails on the ship to three loosed topsails and fore-sail. Thunder and lightning were constant, and the lightning played all around the ship so that the yards were alight with electricity. The night was intensely dark and nothing could be seen but the electric light. The sailors

had to feel their way about the ship. Hail fell in torrents nearly all the time. Then there was an encounter with a waterpump, so Captain Graham relates. It was in latitude 2 degrees 16 minutes north, longitude 236 degrees 42 minutes west, and it was exciting. Many of those on board thought death was inevitable. "The day was stormy," said Captain Graham, "and about 9 a. m. two waterpumps were seen rapidly approaching the ship astern. The larger of the two seemed to be fifty feet in circumference. Though the vessel was being overhauled by the waterpumps, I took in all sail, as I feared that if struck by the whirling water when the sails were set the ship would be dismasted. I had often heard that a shot from a cannon would break a waterpump. I had no cannon on board, but determined to try a shot with a rifle. I ordered one to be fired off. Two shots were fired in quick succession at the approaching body of water. It suddenly broke in two just above the base and the top fell like a cloudburst. The smaller waterpump whirled off in another direction.—San Francisco Chronicle.
