Giving Cost and Present Value of the Water Plant. To the Honorable Mayor and Common Council of the City of Astoria, Oregon.

For the month of October our gross receipts were: From acct of water rates \$2,270 90. From acct of turning on water 2 00.

Inventory of loose property of the Astoria Water Commission, with approximate values. 1 600 lb. Cement testing machine \$175 87. 1 Tent (12x14) with fly attachment 15 00.

DISBURSEMENTS. Interest account \$3,600 00. Expense account 290 90. Supt. salary 375 00.

Inventory of the office furniture of the Astoria Water Commission, with approximate values. 1 Safe \$325 00. 1 Counter and desk combined 60 00.
