The steamer Columbia is due this morning from San Francisco.

The steamer Harrison's clearance papers show that she will carry 1,350 boxes of tinplate, valued at \$3,095, shipped by the Pacific Sheet Metal Works in bond to New Westminster, B. C.

The steamer Harrison was unable to sail yesterday morning for British Columbia, as was expected. The severe storm made it impossible for her to put to sea. Weather permitting she will leave out this morning.

The board of trade return on "British Ships (Desertion of Seamen Abroad)" for the year 1895, gives the number of seamen who deserted from British ships in ports of the United States as—at Baltimore 456, Boston 262, Mobile 24, New York 2,630, Norfolk 37, Pensacola 83, Philadelphia 630, other east coast ports 644, Portland, Oregon, 242, San Francisco 922, other North Pacific ports 372, making a total of 6,317 deserters.—Liverpool Journal of Commerce.

The German bark John Wesley arrived from Jaluit, Marshall Islands, yesterday, after a run of sixty-five days. She brought no news of importance from the South Seas. Captain Schwarzwald and the crew which took the new trading schooner Mercer down to the Marshall group returned in the John Wesley. M. Mayn, the first mate of the bark, died at 2 o'clock yesterday morning of dropsy. Instead of burying his body at sea it was brought to Gray's undertaking parlors.—San Francisco Chronicle.

At a meeting of the Fishermen's Union, held in Astoria recently, they voted to fix the price of salmon to the canneries at four and one-half cents. This, no doubt, will precipitate a strike, as the cannery combine claim they cannot pay over four cents, and if four and a half cents is insisted on it will necessitate the closing of the canneries throughout the season. The prospects are not bright for the Columbia river salmon business. All concerned should not forget that the British Columbia fishermen will profit by any trouble on the Columbia about price.—New York Fishing Gazette.

It is reported that the examination of the hull of the old revenue cutter Walcott at Seattle last week resulted in her present owners discovering that they had drawn a prize when they bid her in from Uncle Sam at less than \$4,000. Reports have been current for the last few years in marine circles that the hull of the vessel was about to fall to pieces and that a cruise in her was almost as good as a death warrant. The examination which has been made, however, discloses a far different state of affairs. The hull of the vessel is said to be as sound as a brand new dollar, while her value has jumped from junk shop figures to somewhere in the neighborhood of \$40,000. If that is the case the \$4,000 spent on her already is a rather profitable investment. Her engines, which were at first regarded as the only articles of value on board, are in good condition, but before she is again put in commission her boilers will be renewed. The new owners are reticent about the ultimate use to which their purchase will be put, but it is supposed that after receiving a thorough overhauling she will be put on the Alaska run.—Tacoma News.
