## BLAINE'S RECIPROCITY TREATY.

The new republican tariff law contains a reciprocity clause, and it is in the lines advocated by James G. Blaine.

It differs materially from the reciprocity clause as embodied in the McKinley law.

That clause was a negative, or retaliatory proposition. It threatened retaliation upon those countries which refused to enter into reciprocal relations with the United States.

This was not Mr. Blaine's suggestion; he favored an affirmative proposition.

Mr. Blaine's proposition was like this: To declare the ports of the United States free to all the products of any nation on the American hemisphere upon which no export duties are imposed whenever and so long as such nation shall admit to its ports, free of all national, municipal, provincial and other taxes, our flour, cornmeal and other breadstuffs, preserved meats, fish, vegetables and fruits cottonseed oil and its products, rice and other provisions, including all articles of wood, agricultural implements and machinery, structural steel and iron, steel rails, locomotives and railway cars and supplies, street cars and refined petroleum.

This, it is believed, will increase exports to even a greater extent than under the McKinley law.

The good work of the reciprocity clause in the McKinley law was not realized until it was repealed by a democratic congress. Under the provisions of that law, the export trade of the United States reached high water mark. New markets were opened to American producers, and the country was enjoying the greatest prosperity it ever experienced when the blow fell and ruin followed the triumph of democracy at the polls.

Following the repeal of our reciprocity laws, came retaliatory enactments by many of the countries with whom we were enjoying amicable trade relations. The result was soon apparent in the falling off of our exports, the farmers more than any other class feeling the effects of a restricted market. There was not a country on the globe in which our trade relations were not restricted by this act of the democratic party.

But the scheme of the great Maine statesman is embodied in the tariff measure which the republican senate is about to enact into law and which will go into operation before the beginning of the next fiscal year. The result will be the opening of ports in every foreign country to American products. The merchants of the world will await the American producer. With better markets will come better prices and the return of the prosperous times enjoyed in 1892. The spirit of Blaine has permeated the entire new tariff law.

The immigration question has reached a serious point in Hawaii: A Japanese steamer recently brought 137 laborers from that country to Honolulu. This appears to be a violation of the provisions of the immigrant laws of the island republic. The agents of the Japanese company were arrested for such violation, and the captain of the steamer which brought the immigrants has been denied his clearance papers unless he agrees to carry them back to Japan. The immigrants are detained at quarantine, and threaten to revolt, and this threat is rendered

formidable by the fact that the Japanese now on the islands sympathize entirely with them. As the Japanese number about one-third of the population of the islands, an insurrection would be formidable. The case has been carried into the courts, and in case the decision is against the Japanese, trouble is pretty certain to follow. The Hawaiian authorities declare there is a scheme on foot to import Japanese, with the ultimate purpose of the absorption of the islands by Japan.

November 5, 1896, was a sad day for the trusts, says an exchange. They flourished like a green bay tree during the democratic administration, but the election of a republican president and congress instantly depressed them. The inauguration of President McKinley followed by the meeting of a republican congress and the passage of the tariff bill, shows that their day of control has passed. When the paragraph of President McKinley's inaugural address in which he promised the enforcement of the anti-trust laws reached Wall street, there was an instant tumbling in all the trust stocks. The Tobacco Trust lost more than one per cent; Consolidated Gas, one and a fourth; Chicago Gas, one and three-eighths; Leather, two; and Sugar Trust, two and a half.

The action of the city council last night in placing the city on a cash basis by passing an ordinance to take up the outstanding warrants, drawing 8 per cent interest, by an issue of 20 year bonds to draw 6 per cent interest, cannot fail to meet with the approval of every citizen and taxpayer, and is highly commendable on the part of that body, showing its wisdom and careful guardianship of the taxpayers which they represent.
