DENY THE ALLEGATION.

Astoria, Or., April 13.—(Editor As-
torian).—An article in the Budget
states that Quong Sing Co. and the
Chinese Union, recently formed, had
issued orders that no more white la-
bor, that is boys and girls, should be
employed in the canneries, and that
if they were employed, no Chinaman
would work in the canneries. The Chi-
nese contractors employ a foreman to
superintend the putting up of salmon,
and have nothing to do with the em-
ployment of white labor. No such or-
ders have ever been issued, and if any
of the canneries see fit to employ white
labor in the canneries, no Chinaman
will quit work for the reason that all
contracts have already been made and
it would be impossible for the Chinese
Union to issue any such orders with-
out violating every contract made.
The Chinese Union was organized for
the purpose of assisting needy and
poor Chinamen, who were sick or un-
able to work; to hire doctors, or send
them back to China, but not for the
purpose of interfering with white la-
bor. The article is absolutely false
and unfounded. The contractors do
not care if white labor is employed or
not.
