from heart failure. The deceased was
a native of Ireland and came to this
country many years ago. He settled
at Albany in this state, and fifteen
years ago came to Astoria, where he
piled his trade as a stone mason. For
quite a while he prospered and did
considerable work. Finally he con-
tracted for the opening of what is now
Eleventh street, and a law suit fol-
lowed. He lost nearly all he possessed
in this suit. Since that time he has
done odd jobs around the city. For
many years he lived at O'Brien's hotel,
but stopped at the Central for the past
two years. He was married but has
only one son living. The son runs
the new Pacific. Blake was subject
to frequent attacks of heart failure,
and said he knew he would some day
drop dead. He was a devout Catholic
and the funeral will be held from St.
Mary's church Sunday.
