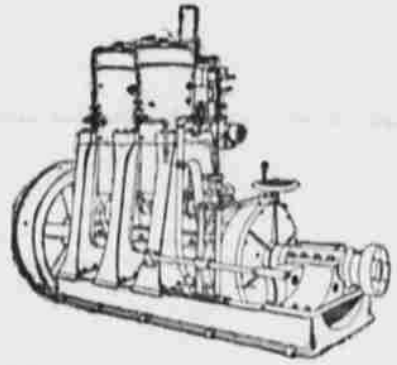

REVIEW OF THE EASTERN WAR

Compact of the Powers. According to Henry Clews, Stronger Than Ever to Maintain the Peace of Europe.

New York, April 24.—Wall street has shown a decided recovery of tone during the past week. The "bears" have exhibited considerable alacrity in covering their sales.

After some months of timid scanning of the Eastern question, London, Paris and Berlin and equally New York seem to have come to a simultaneous conclusion that while it has some conceivably very grave possibilities, yet the probabilities preponderate so largely in favor of the war being localized to Turkey and Greece that there is no sufficient reason why the financial markets of the world should be held in chronic restraint by these conditions.

Out of all this will come some considerable establishment of mutual confidence between the Powers. Presidents have been established for future guidance at the most sensitive point in European politics.
