FISHERMAN DROWNED.

Several Fatalities Reported Yesterday in the Lower River.

Early yesterday morning John Hendrickson, one of the Columbia Cannery Company's fishermen, was drowned on Clatsop Spit. The boat was turned over in a heavy swell; the boat-puller was saved by fishermen who were near by, but Hendrickson went down before they could reach him. Full particulars have not yet been received. The Fort Stevens life saving crew did all they could to save his life but could only reach the spot in time to bring the boat-puller to shore.

Hendrickson was a Russian Finn, about 35 years old, and leaves no family. It was also reported that several other boats were capsized in the same swell, and yesterday afternoon one of Kinney's boats and a net were found capsized on North Shore, but the number of the boat could not be learned, nor were its occupants known up to a late hour. One of the other boats said to be in trouble is supposed to belong to the Cutting Packing Co.

Mr. Sam Maddock, who spent yesterday in the city, said that Contractor Normie yesterday finished the grade of the new railroad track to Logan's mill and made a fine job of it. Track-laying will commence in a day or two. He also says that a number of new cottages are under construction. A meeting of the dwellers of the Elk creek toll road will be held May 28, at the office of the Seaside saw mill, for the purpose of making plans for repairing the road and bridges. The Logan Elk Creek House is very nearly completed, and will be ready for the season.

Prof. Jackson on Beets. Southern Oregon Making a Good Showing for This Season.

Prof. T. J. Jackson, who was so long connected with Astoria's public schools, and an enthusiast upon education, who is now visiting the city from southern Oregon, says that he has recently become interested in the cultivation of sugar beets in that part of the state, where he thinks the enterprise will be a success. "It has been demonstrated that the farmers of Douglas county can produce twenty-five to thirty tons of sugar beets to the acre, and at \$4 per ton they are a paying crop. Even as a crop for cattle food there is more money in them and better results are obtained than from turnips, so that the farmers can afford to grow them and feed them until a sugar beet factory is established in Oregon.

"Our farmers generally have taken hold of the proposition. A committee was appointed to secure the subscription of 300 acres for experimental growing of sugar beets, and that acreage has now been practically guaranteed. This will make a good showing, and if a few more such associations were formed in the State it would not take long to secure a factory.

"We find that on the rich low lands the percentage of sugar in the beets is not so great as on the high lands, but all produce beets that will pay to manufacture. The agricultural college at Corvallis is furnishing the tests and will analyze the beets. The experiments cannot fail to be successful."
