are beginning to inquire when Oregon strawberries are coming in, and what the prospects of the strawberry crop are. Dealers say the California berries are a little larger this season than usual, and it is hoped that they will not control this market so long as usual.

They have advised from Hood River growers, who say they will have berries in this market between May 10 and 15. Last year no berries arrived here from Hood River until about May 20.

The Hood River crop promises to be very large, some estimating it at 25,000 cases. As a general thing, the shipments are not extensive, most of the crop being shipped East; but if the crop is as large as is predicted, there will probably be more shipped here this season.

In garden around Mount Tabor and vicinity the frost last November killed many of the old strawberry vines; but, with the increased acreage planted a year ago and this spring, there will be a plentiful supply for this market, which will begin coming in about June 1.

The young vines are in good condition, and will produce a good crop.
