Mr. Theodore Olson has just completed painting his house in a light shade, which is now quite the style, and a very appropriate one for Astoria, where there is very little coal smoke. This is not the only house re-painted in light colors this season, and it speaks well for the taste of property-owners that they have so quickly recognized what is beneficial to themselves, as well as the community.

Early yesterday morning one of the horses belonging to Engine Company No. 3 died, it is said, from the effects of poison. The horse had been ailing for several days, but turned out at the fire Tuesday. The other horse of the team was also affected, but is now recovering. Whatever caused the trouble, or who the perpetrators were, or a scheme, if any, to make trouble for the fire company, are unknown.

Collector C. H. Page yesterday purchased from the captain of the Japanese bark now in port a Japanese yen. This is the silver coin of Japan. In size it is about that of the American dollar, weighs four hundred and sixteen grains, and is nine hundred fine. The coin secured by Collector Page is a new one, and while of purer silver than American coin, has an actual value in American silver money of only fifty and five-tenths cents.

The schooner Kate and Ann, with a crew of eighteen men, will some time today or tomorrow put to sea on a hunt for otters. Fisher Bros. will ship the cargo of 329 sealions to T. M. Lamson & Co., London, for which bills of lading have already been taken out. The balance of the old crew were paid off yesterday, and after cruising about in Alaskan waters for two or three months the Kats and Ann will again put back into the Columbia.

In the county court yesterday the consideration of various road matters was continued. Numerous claims were examined and allowed in regular form. The Great Round World, a weekly newspaper for children, published in New York city, announces that a supplement to that magazine there will be issued with the April 29th number a specially prepared Guano-Turkish war map. The publishers say that great care has been taken in the production of this map, and that owing to their fine collection of maps and extra facilities, they believe that this one will be the best map of that locality yet produced. It is made in outline and is 14x17 inches in size.

Wednesday evening a meeting of the vestry of Grace church was held for the purpose of electing officers, it being the first regular meeting of the organization since the regular annual church meeting Easter Monday. There were present Rev. Shutter, H. G. Van Dusen, A. S. Tee and Dr. Tuttle. The officers elected were: Senior warden, E. Z. Ferguson; junior warden, W. T. Chatter; clerk, Harrison Allen; treasurer, H. G. Van Dusen; delegates to the diocesan convention, Messrs. Frank Stettin, Alfred S. Tee and Harrison Al-

len; alternate, Messrs. O. I. Peterson, B. Van Dusen and E. C. Lewis.

The storm of yesterday morning created no little trouble on the bay. The water was rougher than it has been in many weeks past. It was reported that a large number of fishing boats were capsized. It is known that Kinney's boat, No. 49, commanded by Anshu Lunt, was capsized in a squall, but the men were picked up by the launch Independence, which also towed the boat and net ashore. One of George & Barker's boats was overturned. It is said, and the steamer Occident also towed a fishing boat to shore in the afternoon. A good many rumors were afloat, to the effect that a dozen or more boats capsized at Sand Island, but a fisherman who returned from there last night said there was nothing in it.

Mr. C. W. Holmes, whose handsome residence on Irving avenue overlooks the northeastern part of the city, is doing good work beautifying his grounds. After the fashion set by his neighbor, Mr. K. Osburn, Mr. Holmes is terracing his back yard, planting shrubbery and trees, and making flower shows. The result obtained by him so far that a good example has its influence, and also that Mr. Holmes has good judgment in landscape gardening. How much better it is to see neat cottages and handsome residences, surrounded by beautiful grounds, instead of potatoes patches filled with old tomato cans. There is nothing that so impresses a stranger with a city as the character of its homes and surrounding grounds.

Yesterday afternoon, immediately after the storm, and while the water was still rough in the bay, two small boys, in a very small skiff, rigged with a home made sail, which flapped about very dangerously with every squall of wind, were seen sailing in from the middle channel. They managed to land safely, although a number of persons who were standing on the dock, watching their maneuvers, expected to see them capsized every moment. It seems strange that parents should permit young boys to go out upon the river in such a frail craft, particularly during stormy weather. No wonder there are drownings recorded every few days. When stout sailors of experience are captured while handling large and strong boats, it would seem folly for children to be out for the fun of it in a mere eggshell of a craft.

In the police court, yesterday afternoon, Christine D. Sing swore out a warrant for the arrest of Say Yee, on a charge of disorderly conduct. The woman is the same one who a short time ago was mixed up in the Ark Wo case. She is the wife of a Chinaman, and seems to be in a great deal of trouble. Evidently she has incurred the displeasure of the highlanders, one of whom, the defendant in this case, yesterday again tried to do her harm. He kicked in the door to her room, but before affecting an entrance the woman fired at him with a revolver, and the Chinaman ran away—not, however, before he was recognized. Chief Hallock arrested the man on the street, and Judge Nelson placed him under bonds of \$300, which were furnished in cash. The preliminary trial will probably be held in the justice court today.

Now that property-owners are doing spring housecleaning, outside as well as inside of their homes, it is also proper that the increased interest in public parks has begun to take tangible shape. A city cannot be a city without public breathing spots. Today Astoria has not a single park fitted with any kind of conveniences devoted to the amusement and health of its citizens. In most places there is at least a square every half mile or so where green grass, flowers, and a drinking fountain offer rest and refreshment to the passerby, to say nothing of the large parks where hundreds can find amusement and a short season of communion with nature. Astoria has many natural sites for a park, and a large portion of its hillsides are today only wastes of rough timber and weeds. Civilization demands that people in the cities have something more, and it is a satisfaction to know that the day is not far distant when at least one public park will be opened in Astoria as an aid to pleasure and health of the people.

The city council or the property-owners on Commercial street should next undertake the re-paving of that thoroughfare through the entire business portion of the city. Bond street has been put in good condition between Eleventh and Twelfth, and the work of repaving it between Eleventh and Commercial is almost as good as done. Bond street was, and in one respect it is worse off, being the principal business street of the city. The owners of buildings along this street get good rents, and one of the largest merchants on the street said yesterday that as a mere matter of pride, to say nothing about the safety to their property, the owners of lots and buildings should at once combine to re-pave Commercial in the same manner as Bond street has been improved.
