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Matt Korpela, one of Elmora's fishermen, delivered to the Uniontown cannery yesterday morning one of the largest, if not the largest, salmon ever captured in the Columbia or any other river. The monster was one of the truest and most perfect specimens of royal chinook salmon ever seen in Astoria. His actual measurement from tip to tip was four feet five and one-half inches, and his largest circumference three feet. The girth close to the tail was fully one foot. The spread of the tail was one foot four inches, and the exact weight eighty-one and one-half pounds. The head when severed from the body weighed eight and one-half pounds, and on being cooked and packed the fish was found to fill five and a quarter dozen one-pound cans.
