Officer Oberg arrested the man and put him in the cooler.

On Tuesday, June 1, delegates from all the clubs in the Oregon-Washington football league will meet at Lewiston. The following teams are entered, Haves, Fort Canby, Chinook, Long Beach, Nacoma and Astoria. It is likely South Bend will also enter, although there has been some doubt about that team. The Portland and Vancouver teams are yet to be heard from. The members of the league will contest for the handsome silver trophy presented by Mr. George Hartley. At the mass meeting at the opera house last night to consider a Fourth of July celebration, a large number of citizens were present. Mayor Taylor called the meeting to order, and after some discussion, appointed the following committee of general arrangement, with full power to appoint sub-committees: Judge Gray, Messrs. Stockton, Reed, Bawley, C. W. Fulton. It was decided to celebrate Saturday, the third of July. The general committee appointed the following sub-committees: Finance—E. C. Hughes, P. F. Kendall, George Hartley, Vocal music—Messrs. Short, Wyatt, Barker, Griffin, Thompson. The committee will meet at the call of the chairman, and from the spirit manifested at the meeting it may be safely assumed that the greatest Fourth of July celebration in the history of Astoria will be held this year.

Judge McPride closed the present term of the circuit court yesterday. The most important decision rendered was in the case of August Hilstrom vs. William Peterson. This case is of interest to persons who have procured homestead titles through fraudulent means. Some years ago Hilstrom deeded to Peterson an interest in his homestead near Kamoa, on condition that, when the latter made final proof, one-half of it would be deeded to Hilstrom. Peterson made final proof two years ago, but refused to fulfill his agreement, on the ground that it was contrary to law and could not be enforced. The suit was brought to compel Peterson to live up to the contract. The court held that such an agreement necessarily compelled a party, as in making final proof the laws of the United States provide that the settler shall take oath that he alone is interested in the land. Judge McPride believed Peterson innocent of an attempt at fraud. The demurrer was sustained and privilege to file an amended complaint extended. In the case of J. E. Dellinger vs. Clatsop county, the demurrer was sustained and the plaintiff allowed till June 1 to file an amended complaint. The suit was brought to compel the county to pay for printing matter, valued at \$236, furnished ex-Sheriff Smith. The court held that, as the fee system was in force at the time the printing was done, the ex-Sheriff was responsible for the debt.
