BIG RUN OF FISH

Salmon Coming Into the River Now in  
Large Numbers.

The steady increase of fish during the  
past week culminated yesterday in an  
all-time run of the fattest, most choice  
seen in Astoria in a long time.

It was reported last night that one of  
the Bureks and Epine's pluggers  
brought in 11 tons, while last Monday the  
same boat had but three tons. Out of  
this lot 90 fish were weighed and were  
found to average 36-1/2 pounds each. One  
of Epine's pluggers had 20 tons; one  
of Burek's five tons, and one of the co-  
operative cannery's pluggers brought in  
12 tons, that institution having 150 tons  
holding for it.

It was also reported that the co-opera-  
tive cannery has sold four carloads of  
lipwood tails at 8c per box, and 1-1/2  
and 3 per cent commission.

Fred Lemon, Kinney's fisherman, who  
was rescued from the breakers Thursday,  
while fishing at the mouth of the river,  
Saturday, got into the breakers again  
and had to cut away his net to save  
himself and boat. Yesterday he was  
stilted out with new gear. His fortune  
seems to be cross-grained this season.
