

RESTRICTIONS ON AMERICAN BEEF

The Administration About to Adopt an Important Policy.

PROTEST FILED WITH EUROPE

To Be Followed by Retaliatory Measures if This Should Prove Ineffectual.

Washington, June 9.—The administration has outlined an important policy to end, if possible, the controversies between the government and Great Britain, Germany and Belgium, regarding the exclusion of American cattle and dressed beef.

This policy contemplates the submission of an earnest joint protest by the diplomatic representatives of the United States at London, Berlin, Paris and Brussels, aiming at the revocation of the discriminatory regulations which these nations have imposed upon American cattle and beef. Before their departure for their respective posts, Ambassadors Hay, Porter and White received instructions to confer with each other and with Delany Storer, the new minister to Brussels, for the purpose of taking action in the matter. Mr. Storer was at the state department yesterday receiving his final instructions before he sails on Wednesday next for his post in Belgium. Mr. Storer's instructions contemplate the commencement of negotiations with the Belgian government with a view to securing a removal of the restrictions now imposed upon American cattle and beef.

In case the protests made by the four diplomats named are not effective, retaliatory measures may be adopted by the United States in the cases of all the governments named.

SECRET CUBAN EXPEDITION.

Successfully Fitted Out in Boston, the Hub of the Universe.

New York, June 9.—A dispatch to the Press from Boston says:

Col. Shepard Young, a well-known total military man, in an interview divulged the details of a secret Cuban expedition, which left Boston on May 22, and picked up several recruits in New York. Today he received a cipher telegram from Jacksonville conveying the news that they had just sailed from that city on a fast light-draught steamer, 115 strong, armed with rifles of the latest pattern. All have seen service in the militia. A movement has been started to organize a community commission to supply stores. Col. Young says: "I conducted the drills in a hall in Boston, put them through the infantry tactics, cavalry tactics and artillery tactics. Every man could load and fire a cannon, no matter what the size, and swing a sabre or use a bayonet. Not a soldier left Boston until he was drilled sufficiently to take charge of a regiment. The tactics were taught in this city mostly at night. We got word from New York that a spy had been sent to Boston. We did not see him. The troops practised with the muskets that are used mostly for front cut. The muskets are heavier than a sabre and the weight of one is hard work, but the men soon learned to use it with skill."

NORDICA WANTS HER MONEY.

Will Sue the Royal Opera Syndicate for Damages.

New York, June 9.—A dispatch to the Journal from London says:

Mme Nordica told today that she has placed her professional affairs in the hands of Henry Mapleson, and acting on his advice will at once sue the Royal Opera Syndicate, of which Maurice Grau is managing director, for her salary, amounting to about \$5,000, and for heavy damages to her reputation as an artist in not being permitted to sing at Covent Garden during the present opera season. Interview with Col. Mapleson, who said he spoke in behalf of Mme. Nordica, published in the Daily Mail Saturday, he said with reference to her quarrel with Jean De Reszke: "Nothing is to be further from Mme. Nordica's desire than to continue the quarrel. She is of forgiving and generous disposition."

FURTHER EVIDENCE OF MURDER.

Expert Finds Similarity to Figel's Writing in the Forged Signature.

Ban Francisco, June 9.—The attorneys for Hoffman, Rothschild & Co., who assert that Isaac Hoffman was murdered, have engaged among other experts the noted handwriting expert, Daniel T. Ames, and he has given a written opinion that the signature of Isaac Hoffman on a receipt for \$9,000, which is an important document in the case, was forged. The receipt other than the signature was written by the bookkeeper, Thos. Figel, as he himself has admitted.

Expert Ames finds similarity of style between Figel's writing and the disputed signature attached to the receipt.

Attorney Ash expressed the opinion to Chief of Police Lees that Figel should be arrested for alleged embezzlement, but the chief did not think he would be justified in proceeding to that extremity on the facts presented to him. When Mr. Rothschild, the New York member of the firm, arrives in this city this week, Ash says that he will advise him to have Figel arrested.

In order to meet the point made by Ash that there is no blood on the grip of the pistol with which Hoffman was killed, Chief Lees after a close examination has discovered several small scissures in the guard of the trigger, which, he says, may have been caused by blood.

THE MYSTERY SOLVED.

Sacramento, Cal., June 9.—The mystery has been finally solved how the opium, morphine and cocaine fiends in the Folsom state prison have been supplied with the drugs they have craved in spite of the utmost vigilance of Warden Aull. After a systematic investigation, continuing without interruption for two months, L. N. Desmarais, the prison chemist and druggist for the past two years was accused of having supplied the drugs. When confronted with the damaging evidence against him he broke down and confessed. His account showed that he would receive at the expense of the state a great quantity of drugs not required in the prison or that were never ordered by the physician. The drugs were such as would satisfy the cravings of fiends. Most of these drugs were cocaine, codeine, salicin, antikainina and aristol.

The bills also showed that the druggist purchased 100 per cent more alcohol than was required and he also bought at the expense of the state 6,000 morphine pills.

In his confession the druggist said that he had been engaged in the wholesale traffic of selling drugs to the convicts since last November. He has been discharged from his position and ordered to leave the prison at once. The warden is considering the advisability of prosecuting him. A guard named Tierney was discharged this morning for a cause not known and it is rumored that other guards will be discharged.

BIG PURSES TO PARTICIPANTS

Ban Francisco, June 9.—The cycle racing men on this coast will have opportunities shortly to race for larger purses than any offered in the East up to the present time. 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
